My dear Mr. Gravatt:

I am in receipt of your letter of August 7th, telling me that Dr. C. J. [unclear] expects to make an inspection of the Cooperative Chestnut Planting at my place in Pennsylvania sometime soon.

You ask me to give you specific information as to the location of the planting, giving you a rough chart as to Roads and Towns. The planting was made on Roundtop Mountain located in Warrington Township, York County, PA. The nearest Towns are Bowmansdale, Wellsville and Rossville. The Mountain is about fifteen miles from Harrisburg. Anyone in the three Towns mentioned can give you specific information as to how to reach the Mountain as it is in plain view of all three places. There is a road up the Mountain that an Automobile can travel directly to the Chestnut planting. I would suggest, however, that if it is possible for Dr. Nusbaum to do so, he visit the planting on some Friday or Saturday as I am in Pennsylvania every week. However, if that is not possible, then I would suggest that he go to my farm at Wellsville, Pennsylvania, and there he will find Mr. Charles He [unclear] who did the planting and will show him the location of the trees.

"although the seed records of the old Asaph Nursery, which was abandoned in 1920, are stored and an extensive search would require much time and expense, I will do my best to reply.

As I recall it, we planted some on State Forest land along boundary of Warrant #2448, the ranger who did the planting had left the service when we looked them up for results, we never found any, whether rabbits destroyed them, they were frozen back or were simply overlooked in the hardwood regeneration, we cannot say.

At Ranger E.N. Jenckes' residence, Ansonia, were planted 7 trees. Jenckes reports as follows of these: 'I planted 7 here 2 were broken off by a falling apple tree, 1 did not establish, 1 broken off by a run-away horse, 2 were killed by a running ground vine which girdled near the collar, and cut bark before being noticed, 1 is still living. Several years it froze back, but now seems to be growing well. Is about 12 ft. high, forked at the collar giving 2 prongs to the tree. It bore fruit in

1931 and 1932. During the fall of 1931 Dr. Zeigler saw what he called blight on the limb nearest the ground, asked me to cut it off. During spring, I think May of 1932, Prof. Geo. Perry examined it and said there seemed to be no further evidence of blight. Perry was with Zeigler when the trouble was located.'

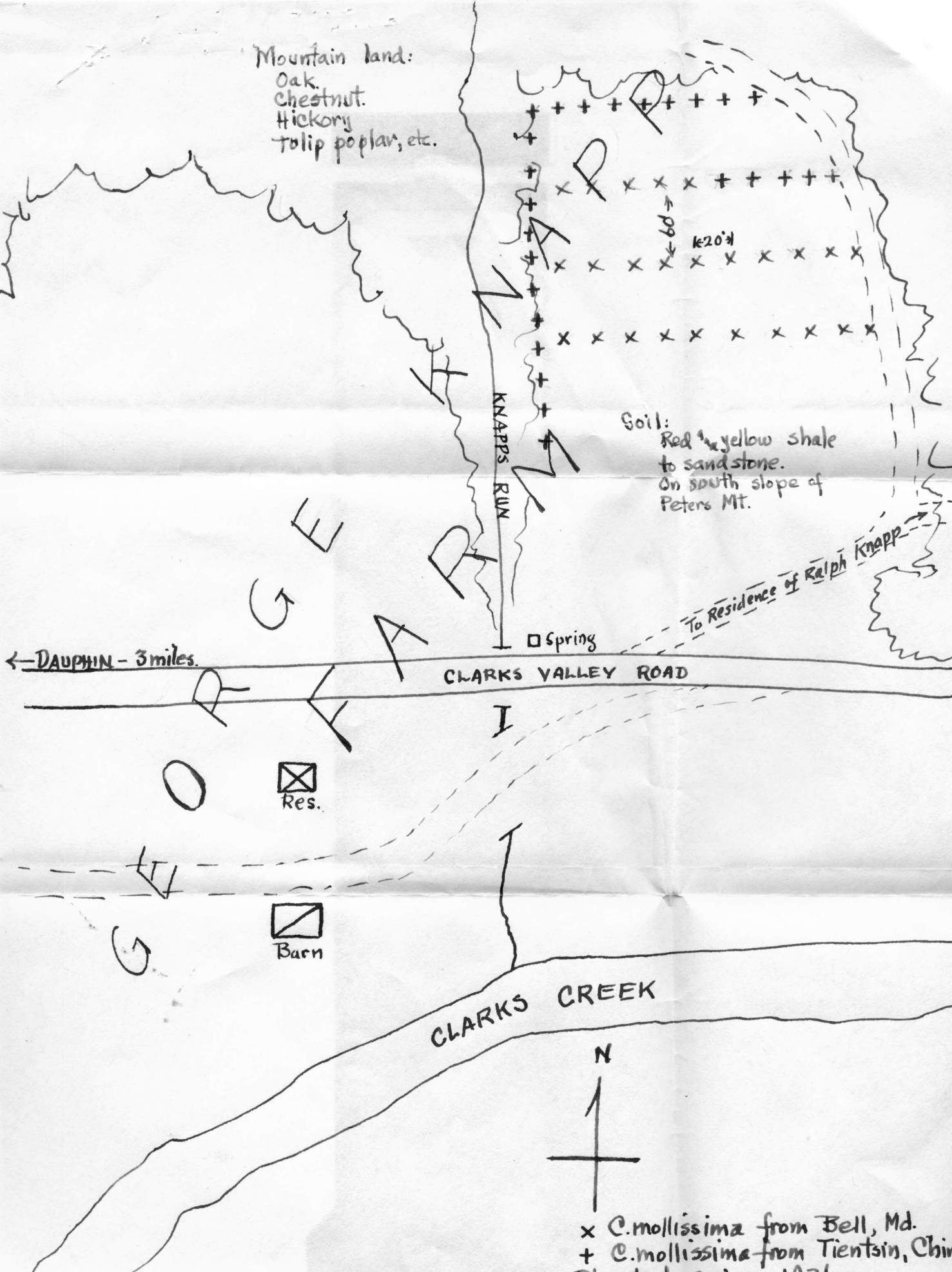

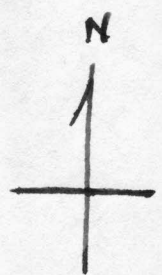
