The Marine Recreational Information Program

NOAA launched a program in 2010 called the **Marine Recreational Information Program** (MRIP). It replaces the Marine Recreational Fishing Statistical Survey (MRFSS) that had been collecting information about angling in the U.S. since the 1980s. MRIP differs from MRFSS in that potential biases are removed. In other words, it better addresses some of the issues that affected the quality of data that MRFSS collected and analyzed, and the accuracy of the catch and effort estimates that were produced.

Along with MRIP, NOAA also set up a <u>National Saltwater Angler Registry</u>. Federal law requires any angler who fishes for saltwater or anadromous fish in U.S. waters to register with the Registry. Luckily, Connecticut anglers do not have to complete this registration themselves and therefore they can forego the registration fee. Instead, through an agreement between the Connecticut DEEP and NOAA, Connecticut anglers that purchase a **Marine Waters Fishing License** are exempt from the Registry since DEEP automatically registers MWFL holders for free.

What's the catch?

MRIP, the NOAA body that collects data on angling, randomly contacts anglers who are part of the Registry to survey them about their fishing activity.

What's in it for YOU?


