State and local governments play important roles in municipal CMMS goals

Connecticut must improve the performance of municipal recycling systems, **reduce waste**, and increase compliance with mandatory recycling provisions. To make progress, CMMS calls for contributions across the materials management spectrum, including from:

Shared responsibility -

- Product manufacturers
- Consumers/residents
- Institutions/businesses
- Haulers/collectors
- Facilities/processers
- State and local governments



Roles of state and local governments





- Enacts legislation and policy
- Establishes system-wide goals and metrics
- Provides technical assistance/grants
- Promotes best practices
- Provides statewide education and outreach
- Enforces laws and regulations (commercial)
- Permits and regulates facilities
- Make provisions for the safe and sanitary disposal of waste (CGS Sec. 22a-220)
- Enacts policy
- Implements best practices
- Provides education and outreach
- Enforces laws and regulations

2017 Municipal Compliance Report

- Sent to Municipal CEO's on August 1, 2017
- Based on responses to 2016 AMRR Part 6
- Designed to dovetail with 2017 AMRR Part 6
- DEEP's goal is Compliance Assistance
- Focus on PA 10-87 and CMMS Attainment

CMMS Phase 1 – Working with municipalities to reduce waste by 2024

By December 2017, municipalities will:

- Ensure that all residents, institutions, and businesses have access to recycling for all designated materials (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-241i</u>)
- Designate a municipal or regional recycling agent (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-</u> <u>220(i)</u>)
- Report on their recycling programs to DEEP (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-220(h)</u>)
- Register private collectors that operate within the municipality (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-220a(d)(1)</u>)
- Provide collection of recyclables alongside trash in public spaces (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-241k</u>)



CMMS Phase 2 – Working with municipalities to reduce waste by 2024

By December 2018, municipalities will:

- Develop a plan or program for residential and commercial recycling outreach and enforcement of local ordinances and update ordinances (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-220(f)</u>, <u>CGS Sec 22a-241b</u> and <u>RCSA 22a-241b</u>)
- Implement an initiative to reduce disposed waste by 10% from 2014 baseline year, this may include PAYT (consistent with goal established in <u>CGS Sec. 22a-220(f)</u> and CMMS)
- Ensure that all residents have sufficient opportunity to recycle at the rate materials are generated (e.g. bin sizing, collection frequency...) (<u>CGS Sec. 22a-220(f)</u>)





Reducing Waste by 2024 Continued State Support

- Increase education and outreach to residents and businesses through <u>RecycleCT</u>
- Increase enforcement activities to support municipalities and improve multi-tenant housing recycling compliance (DEEP REI Program)
- Provide technical assistance and grants for waste reduction initiatives
 - Municipal and Regional Recycling Assistance Program
 - RecycleCT





Reducing Waste by 2024 Continued State Support

- Host workshops to showcase municipal best management practices
- Convene stakeholders to develop guidance documents and resources
- Continue to partner with product stewardship organizations to pursue policies and legislation that shift the costs of product management to help municipalities save money
