

Regular Meeting of the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners

July 20, 1972

A regular meeting of the Board of Chiropractic Examiners of the State Connecticut was called to order at 8:00 A.M.

Present were Arnold Milette, Sherwin Fischman, Theodore Dombroski and newly appointed member Stephen Owens. Election of officers were as follows: President - Milette, V. president - Owens, Secretary Treasurer - Dombroski. New officers assumed duties.

Correspondence read by Fischman(out-going secretary)

Owens moved to recognize Fischman for services to examining board. Discussion on special May 11, 1972 meeting on M. Swiller of Hartford in which complaint from Mary Bayers, Board of Health was received after a long period of time. In past Board of Health would forward such matters immediately. An inquiry will be made to determine if this is a new policy.

A request for board regulations on Chiropractic and Healing Arts board by Orville Hidde, president of the Council on Chiropractic Education, was submitted by Owens.

Owens and Milette will attend the annual meeting of Council of Chiropractic Examining Boards in Davenport, Iowa, August 18 - 20, 1972 Owens will prepare a Connecticut Board brief on policy to be presented to C.C.E. A letter will be sent to Mary Bayers, Div. of Licensure that Chiropractic Board be notified of re-activation of all inactive licences. A letter to all colleges notifying them that September 1, 1969 was cut off for acceptance with 2 years of pre. A letter to Council of Orthopedics to determine usage of "Chiropractic Orthopedist" in relation to Board 'Qualified of Certified'.

November 16, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 with Drs Milette, Owens and Dombroski in attendance.

First for discussion were board regulations of the Connecticut Chiropractic Examining Board which had been compiled. A copy had been mailed by the secretary of said board, to the assistant attorney general, Mr. David J. Della Bitta, on November 7, 1972. Purpose for this was to secure legal opinion, additions or corrections so that final plans for acceptance could be followed to meet requirements as had been directed by the legislature.

Further discussion had been entered into on a letter from Canton Police Department case #72-406 concerning Dr. Michael J. Swiller, 120 Whitney Street, Hartford. Also discussed was a copy of letter of complaint sent by Dr. Franklin Foote, Commissioner of Health, to Attorney General, Robert K. Killian, concerning Hartford Police Department # 72-21192 report on Dr. Michael J. Swiller. This case was scheduled for first hearing November 13, 1972 at Hartford Circuit Court #14, 155 Morgan Street. At the time of this meeting no information had been received and any determination by the Chiropractic Board of Examiners would have to be taken after completion of court action.

Correspondence received from the following chiropractic colleges (Palmer, Logan and Columbia) asking the present requirements for examination of their graduates. As had been previously established all candidates who are graduates of chiropractic colleges that meet the requirements of the Council of Chiropractic Education are eligible. This ruling by the board was to insure to the Connecticut Citizenry the highest trained chiropractic graduates.

A general maining to the practicing chiropractic profession in Connecticut pointing to the present statue in relation to acupuncture and it's related applications, x-ray procedures and examinations in
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accordance to rules accepted by the Chiropractic Examining Board as had been passed by the Connecticut Chiropractic Association and adopted into its by-laws in 1971.

The term chiropractic orthopedics to be used in preference to chiropractic orthopedist as recommended by the Council of chiropractic orthopedics of the American Chiropractic Association.

The meeting adjourned at 2:30 P.M.

February 1, 1973

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 A.M. in Hartford with Drs Milette, Owens and Dombroski, the entire board present.

An invitation had been extended to Dr. G. Soderstrom, secretary of the Naturopathic board of Examiners and Dr. Dale Turner also a naturopath, to discuss whether certain naturopaths who are licensed in Connecticut might be eligible to apply for a chiropractic license. This is based on the fact that some of these naturopaths had attended a graduate school that taught subjects in chiropractic and also other courses in naturopathy. Dr. Milette pointed out that a similar inquiry had been made in the past and a ruling by the Attorney General stated such an application was not possible. At a board discussion after Drs Soderstrom and Turner had left the decision was made to have the question presented to the Attorney General's office by the Naturopathic Board of Examiners.

The matter of Dr. Chester Ososki of Manchester was brought up for discussion. A report had been received from Dr. Robert Stoker of Manchester, Conn. that he had had patients in his office who stated that they had been treated by Dr. Ososki. One of the patients stated that she had become doubtful whether Dr. Ososki held a license and had called the State Board of Health. She was informed that Dr. Ososki did not hold a valid license to practice chiropractic. The names of the patients were Ellen Graiches of Chelchester, Conn., and Jacqueline Robichaud of E. Hampton, Conn. In speaking to these women by telephone, they stated that between December 1972 and January 1973 each had made between seven or eight visits to 265 Ludlow Drive, Manchester, Conn., and had been treated by Dr. Ososki. This information was sent to Lt. Orlando Ragozzi, Detective Division of the State Police in Hartford to investigate. Trooper Rossi was assigned to investigate. He arrested Dr. Ososki for practicing chiropractic.

Letter of inquiry had been received from Columbia, Logan and Palmer Chiropractic Colleges as to this board's definition of the term equivalent which had been used in determining this board's recognition of their graduates for examination. This board had determined to use the criteria and standards of the Council on Chiropractic Education in lieu of the Association of Chiropractic Colleges. After consideration of both agencies, it was determined that the Association of Chiropractic Colleges were found lacking in history and quality. On the term "equivalent" it was a prerogative of the Board of Chiropractic Examiners to determine what is equivalent and it was the board's opinion to use the criteria based on the Council on Chiropractic Education and its predecessor.

The board recessed to keep a scheduled appointment with the Assistant Attorney General, David J. Della Bitta at 30 Trinity Street, Hartford, Conn. Purpose of this meeting was to discuss the matter of Dr. Michael Swiller of Hartford, Conn., whose case is before the court in Hartford. Related to this matter is the preparation of Board Regulations for the State Board of Chiropractic Examiners and information in preliminary and final forms in accordance with Public Act 854 of the 1971 Legislative Session. The Attorney General advised that this board could not proceed with any consideration on the matter of Dr. Swiller until the Board Regulations had been completed in final form.

The meeting adjourned at 3:30 P.M.

April 26, 1973

The regularly scheduled meeting of the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners was held April 26, 1973 at 9:00 A.M. at 3466 Main Street, Stratford, in attendance were Drs. Arnold Milette of Torrington, President and Theodore J. Dombroski, Stratford, secretary.

The first topic for discussion were the "Rules of Practice" that had been submitted to the Legislative Review Committee on March 30, 1973. The proposed regulations will be placed on the agenda on April 23, 1973 and are slated for final action by the legislative review committee on June 2, 1973. These proposed "Rules of Practice" have been formulated in accordance with the provisions of Public Act #854 of the 1971 Connecticut Legislative Session of the General Assembly and are to be found in Chapter 372# of General Statutes Sections 20-25-1 through 20-25-30. The intent of the proposed "Rules of Practice" had been published in the Connecticut Law Journal page 3B of February 20, 1973 as provided for in the General Statutes. After an interum of 30 days the Rules of Practice had been sent to the Legislative Review Committee for final action as had been previously stated. The section added concerns procedures the Chiropractic Examining Board will follow if it is to conduct hearings. The purpose of its insertion and publication into the Law Journal allowed interested persons to obtain copies and present their views by writing to the Secretary of the Chiropractic Examining Board. Upon final action of the Legislative Review Committee on June 2, 1973 will allow this Board to proceed into hearings on matters coming before this board. The "Rules of Practice" had been approved by the Attorney General's Office on February 7, 1973.

Following this matter the subject of Dr. Michael Swiller was discussed. A letter of inquiry had been sent to Atty. Davis Della Bitta in the Attorney General Office asking if there had been any further developments or determinations on the arrest of Dr. Michael Swiller of Hartford, by the Hartford Police on September 27, 1972. The Board at that time was unable to take any definitive steps on this matter because of the necessity for this board to prepare it's "Rules of Practice". On April 18, 1973 Asst. Atty. Della Bitta telephoned and stated that a Atty. Jackson Webber, representing Dr. Michael Swiller had requested a meeting with Comm. of Health, Dr. Franklin Foote. Atty Della Bitta stated he would inform this board at the proper time.

At the February meeting of this board the Naturopathic Examining Board had inquired if this board could issue chiropractic licenses to members of their profession. A check of our records indicated that an Attorney General ruling in 1940 stated that Naturopaths who attended certain colleges would have to secure two additional years of training to qualify.

On April 5, 1973 the Connecticut Chiropractic Association with the endorsement of the Chiropractic Examining Board held a seminar on Radiation protection for all practicing chiropractors in Connecticut. Members of the environmental protection committee as well as personnel from the Boston office of H.E.W. lectured and presented printed material on radiation precautions. This material as well as those in attendance have been placed in the files of the examining board.

Correspondence for information on licensure, formation information on a new examining board in Mississippi were read and discussed. Information had been sent to the Connecticut Manual Registry in April 1973.

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After a recess for lunch, the board reconvened to examine Dr. William Kallas to determine his qualifications to secure a license in Conn. His application by certification had been received and after examination the board voted to accept Dr. Kallas and issue him a license to practice chiropractic.

Having concluded its business, the board recessed at 3:30 P.M.

July 17, 1973

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met in Stratford, Conn. on July 17, 1973, and convened at 7 p.m. Members present were Dr. Julius Sanna of Danbury, and Theodore Dombroski, Secretary.

Dr. Julius Sanna was appointed to serve on the board of Chiropractic examiners by Gov. Thomas Meskill on July 1, 1973, for a three year period. Dr. Sanna was welcomed to the board, and it was noted that his presence was most welcome, his service would be a credit to the board, to the Chiropractic profession, and the State of Connecticut.

The first order of business was the election of officers, in which Dr. Stephen Owens of Hartford was elected President, Dr. Julius Sanna of Danbury Vice-President, and Dr. Theodore J. Dombroski of Stratford will continue as Secretary and Treas.

The next matter discussed was the acceptance of the Rules of Practice for the Board of Chiropractic Examiners, which had been finally corrected, and certified by the Attorney General. These rules are in compliance with Public Act 854, of the 1971 Legislative session, and have been inserted in the general statutes, Chapter 372, Section 20-25-1 through Section 20-25-30. A letter had been sent to the Secretary of State's office to certify that the Rules of Practice for the Board of Chiropractic examiners had been submitted for publication in the Connecticut Law Journal on February 20, 1973, and they were formally submitted to the Legislative Review Committee of the General Assembly on April 4, 1973, and approved by the Legislative Review Committee of the General Assembly effective June 1, 1973. The Connecticut Chiropractic Board of Examiners at a meeting on April 23, 1973 adopted said Rules, and on June 29, 1973 were approved by the Attorney General's Office.

A letter had been received from the office of the Secretary of State on July 11, 1973 stating that the Rules of Practice of this Board had been received, and said regulations become effective July 11, 1973. The letter had been sent by Louis J. Tapogna, Regulations Supervisor.

With final completion of the Rules of Practice, this Board could proceed with matters that had been tabled pending the completion and acceptance of the Rules of Practice. This was necessary in order for the Board to function, and was brought to our attention by Assistant Attorney General David J. Della Betta.

The main item upon which final approval of Rules of Practice depended was the matter of Dr. Michael J. Swiller of Hartford, who had been arrested by the Hartford police upon a complaint. This matter had been referred to Dr. Foote, Commissioner of Health, who in turn notified the Board of Chiropractic Examiners. At that time, when an inquiry had been made to the Attorney General's office, it was determined that this Board could take no definitive action until we complied with the Administrative Procedure Act, and established Rules of Practice in accordance with

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the 1971 Public Act. On July 16, 1973 the office of the Secretary of this Board, received a letter from Assistant Attorney General David J. Della Betta stating that he had asked Dr. Foote, Commissioner of Health, to bring the matter of Dr. Swiller's October 11, 1972 arrest to a current level as the Board of Chiropractic Examiners was ready to proceed with this matter.

A copy of a letter referred to as a Pace organization newsletter, Pace standing for Patients Association for Chiropractic Education, which had been received from Dr. Raymond Keller, President of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association, was considered in relation to the activities of this organization. Dr. Solomon Aordkian of Naugatuck, who acts as professional advisor to this organization, was asked for some information on the Naugatuck chapter of the Pace organization in the form of a letter. Dr. Aordkian sent several copies of these Pace newsletters. Dr. Sanna commented on these Pace chapters, as to his knowledge of this movement, in that some of the activities relating to procedural and professional considerations should be investigated. There is nothing directly in conflict with any professional violations with Board rules at this time. However, it was felt that Dr. Aordkian should be invited to our next Board meeting to explain and discuss with the Board personally, so they may secure direct information from this doctor who is acting as advisor to the Valley chapter of the Pace organization.

A letter was read from a Sister Barbara Vedder, a graduate of The Columbia Chiropractic College in New York City, in which she asked that as a graduate of Columbia, which is not on the approved colleges, if she could write the healing arts examination. Since she had matriculated prior to November 18, 1971 when this ruling was made by the board, she was eligible.

An answer was sent to the Board of Chiropractic examiners in Sacramento, California giving them the total of the chiropractic practitioners in Conn. as of July 1973

A most recent list of the chiropractors registered in Conn. had been received from Mary Bayers, Div. of Licensure and Registration. At the present time there are 142 registered and 126 in active practice. A discussion by board members indicated a lack of applicants which was possible due to present acceptance by this board of only certain colleges. A review was made of colleges affiliated with the Council on Chiropractic Education and colleges affiliated with the Associated Chiropractic Colleges. At the present time the Connecticut Board only accepts graduates of colleges affiliated with the Council on Chiropractic Education. This rule became effective by a board ruling November 18, 1971. The matter was tabled for further consideration at later meetings.

An application for licensure by certification by Dr. Peter Jankovich of 310 S. Main St. Slippery Rock, Pa., was reviewed. All credentials were in order and would qualify except that he lacked several months to fulfill the required 5 year practice period. The board decided to return his credentials and check and ask Dr. Jankovich to re-apply at a later date.

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A letter of complaint had been received in early June from Dr. Anthony V. Plomitello, a chiropractor of 44 Strawberry Hill Avenue, Stamford concerning Dr. A.W. Paolitto, a chiropractor of 1435 Redford Street, Stamford, Conn., in relation to weekly series of articles that Dr. Paolitto had been writing in the Stamford Forum newspaper. Dr. Plomitello felt the column was a form of advertising and against rules of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association. He further stated that Dr. Cosmo Pocograno and Dr. Pat Sullivan Jr. of Stamford held similar views. Dr. Raymond Keller, President of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association had attempted to determine whether these articles were placed in the Stamford Forum as an advertisement or an unpaid public service type article. The Stamford Forum failed to furnish this information. Dr. Keller mailed a copy of his letter to the Forum to this board. A request was sent to Dr. Paolitto for copies of his column and he was asked if these articles were printed in the Forum by his payment to the paper. Dr. Paolitto submitted copies of many articles as well as a letter stating that he does not pay to have them printed in the Forum. Reviewing the articles it was noted they were well written in content and style. The Board however suggested some changes to conform with rules on advertising that the Connecticut Chiropractic Assn. had adopted some time ago and with which the Board of Chiropractic Examiners agreed.

1. Telephone listing by the author should be omitted.
2. Dr. Paolitto should delete his name and use instead a designation such as group, district for example Fairfield County Chiropractic Assn.
3. That all material should be submitted prior to publication to the proper committee in the Connecticut Chiropractic Assn.

An application by Dr. Seymour Leibowitz, a chiropractor of Passaic N.J., was made for licensure by certification. A review of his credentials was made and found acceptable. An application will be sent to him, and he will be asked to appear before the next regular meeting of the Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

Several inquiries had been received from Dr. Eugene Terrona of Millertown, New York, and a John M. Lawton, Attorney, of Torrington, Conn., in behalf of Dr. Terrona, requesting licensure by certification. Information had been sent to Dr. Terrona directly and through his attorney. It had been determined by a subsequent telephone conversation that Dr. Terrona does not have the required two years of pre professional credits, and was told that this was required by statute.

Several letters had been received from the State Dept. of Health from a Louis J. Halpryn, Acting Director, Div. of Hospital and Medical care, seeking this Boards' help in the certification of the Chiropractors in the State of Connecticut for Medicare purposes which had become effective July 1, 1973.

Having completed its business, the Board of Chiropractic examiners recessed at 11:00 p.m.

November 1, 1973

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met October 25, 1973 at the Yale Motor Inn in a regularly scheduled meeting. Members present were Drs Owens of Hartford, Sanna of Danbury and Dombroski of Stratford.

The first matter for consideration was an application of Dr. Seymour Liebowitz of 674 Eagle Rodk Avenue, West Orange, New Jersey for licensure by certification. Dr. Liebowitz had submitted his credentials as follows: high school graduate, B.A. degree from New York U. Washington Square College and received his D.C. from Lincoln Chiropractic College. He had also attended National in Chicago. He graduated in June of 1952. He was examined by the composite board of the New Jersey board of Medical Examiners in April of 1954. He received his license and has practiced in New Jersey since that time.

After an oral and Practical examination by this board an opinion was reached that his educational and professional qualifications were acceptable. However a statue consideration in Chapter 372 (chiropractic) Sec. 20-27 states that this board may issue a license without examination (healing arts) to a licensee of a similar state who holds a certificate of proficiency in the basic sciences from a state board of Healing Arts or a state board of Basic Science examiners, etc. Since the examination in New Jersey is administered by both chiropractic and medical doctors an opinion would be asked of the Conn. Atty. Gen. if this Composite Board in New Jersey would be comparable to a Healing Arts or Basic Science Board. Further consideration was tabled pending this opinion.

A Pace organization (patients association for chiropractic education) of Naugatuck has been brought to the attention of this board. Dr. Solomon Aordkian of Naugatuck has been acting as professional advisor and has been active with this group in newspaper, radio and other related activities. Dr. Aordkian was asked by this board to meet informally to explain the purpose and aims of the Pace movement and his association with it. After a prolonged discussion this board advised Dr. Aordkian to discuss this matter with the Connecticut Chiropractic Association. A letter outlining this board discussions will be sent to the C.C.A. A summary of topics discussed with Dr. Aordkian will be placed in his file for future reference.

A letter which has been sent to the Bureau of Health Insurance (Mr. Robert O'Malley) Boston, Mass., stating this boards winningness to cooperate fully for Medicare certification for chiropractors of Conn. This was relative to a telephone conversation with Mr. O'Malley stating our position in relation to confidential information contained in our files. Our position was taken upon the advice of the Atty. Gen. office. The bureau of Health Insurance has not yet replied to the Oct. 3, 1973 letter.

The board was informed that no further information has been received concerning Dr. Michael Swiller of Hartford. A letter of inquiry will be sent to Mary Bayers at the Div. of Licensure, Bd of Health.

Having concluded its business the board recessed on a vote to adjourn.

January 31, 1974

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met for a regularly scheduled meeting on January 31, 1974 in Waterbury. Members present were Dr. Stephen Owens, Hartford; Dr. Julius Sanna, Danbury; Dr. Theodore Dombroski, secretary, Stratford; all members of the board were present.

Dr. Owens reported that he had an inquiry from a member of the Podiatry Board, Dr. Irving Friedman of South Windsor on the use of "Foot Levelers" in relation to treatment. This inquiry concerned Dr. Calvin Wade a chiropractor of New Britain. Dr. Owens explained to Dr. Friedman that "Foot Levelers" are used in a chiropractic practice to stabilize and level the structural integrity of the spine and pelvis and are not intended to treat the foot as arch supporters which are used by other practitioners.

The application for licensure by certification of Dr. Seymour Liebowitz of New Jersey was next discussed. Dr. Liebowitz had submitted his credentials and he had been interviewed at our last meeting. Since the New Jersey Board is classified as a composite board and is called the New Jersey Board of Medical Examiners as stated in the Official Directory of the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards, consisting of 3 medical and 1 chiropractic doctors, a decision was made to ask an opinion of the Attorney General's Office and the matter was tabled. Attorney Della Bitta of the Connecticut Attorney General's Office telephoned stating that Dr. Liebowitz might apply through the Healing Arts Board. However, Chapter 372 Section 20-27 of the Connecticut General Statutes allows this board to accept by certification applicants of a similar board and Dr. Liebowitz's credentials met these standards, it was decided to accept him for licensure pending his meeting with this board during our next session.

Another application was reviewed from Dr. Thomas Bernie of Denver, Colorado for licensure by certification. All his credentials were in order and a decision to have him attend our next board meeting for an interview.

A letter of inquiry, and a copy of an incomplete Healing Arts application, many patients letters for granting a certification consideration were reviewed concerning Dr. Eugene Terrana of Millertown, N.Y. This matter had been considered previously and determined that Dr. Terrana did not meet statutory requirements. To clear this matter and give Dr. Teranna full consideration it was decided to ask him to attend our next meeting. All correspondence was read and answers formulated.

Having concluded its business for the day, the board adjourned.

April 18, 1974

The Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners met at a regularly scheduled meeting on April 18, 1974 in Hartford in the conference room of the Connecticut Board of Healing Arts offices.

The Board convened at 8:30 A.M. to conduct its regular business meeting and interview several candidates for license by certification. Members present were Stephen E. Owens D.C., Julius L Sanna D.C. and Theodore J. Dombroski D.C., the entire board.

The board first considered the content and material of a recently purchased set of questions and x-ray slides for projection purposes for examination of candidates for licensure by examination. Content was considered satisfactory and felt it would be of benefit to this board. The material had been prepared by the Federation of Chiropractic Examining Board to help in the standardization of examining procedures of all chiropractic examining boards.

The board next considered the matter of candidates who had recently taken the Healing Arts examination on February 8, 1974. Two candidates complained to this board that they felt that the examinations in anatomy and physiology had been graded too severely. These questions in the subjects mentioned were of an essay type answers. They stated that they felt their grades were lower than they had expected. This board requested permission from Attorney Bach of Danielson, chairman of the State Board of Healing Arts to review the examinations of Leonard Ciancolo and Barbara Vedder. Dr. Ciancolo is a graduate of the National Chiropractic College and Dr. Vedder is a graduate of Columbia Institute of Chiropractic. Permission was granted for this board to review the examinations.

This board met in Mrs Kennedys office, secretary to the State Board of Healing Arts on April 2, 1974 at 1:00 P.M. After reviewing the examinations of Drs Ciancolo and Vedder this board felt the necessity to ask permission of the Healing Arts Board to have these examinations reviewed by an outside authority such as the department heads at the National Chiropractic College on the subjects in question.

This board is awaiting an answer to its request.

This board interviewed two candidates for licensure by certification. The first was Peter J. Jankovich D.C. of Slippery Rock Pa. He is a 4 year graduate of Columbia University (1965) and received his doctor of chiropractic degree from the National Chiropractic College in 1969 and has practiced for five years in Penn. All board members voted to grant him a license. The next applicant was Seymour Liebowitz D.C. of W. Orange N.J. He is a 4 year graduate of New York University and received his chiropractic degree from the Lincoln Chiropractic College in 1951. He has practiced in New Jersey since 1954. The board voted to grant him his license.

Both doctors stated a desire to locate their offices in Conn. within a short period.

Following this, the board next interviewed Dr. Eugene Terrana of Millertown, New York. Dr Terrana has shown an intrest to secure a license to practice chiropractic in Conn. His first request was through Attorney John M Lawton of Torrington, Conn. At that time (June 1973) a copy of the statues was sent. Dr. Terrana was advised to apply to the Connecticut State Board of Healing Arts to secure a license by examination. He filed a preliminary application with that board and later with-drew it and never followed through. He later followed instructions and submitted his educational background to this board. Due to a lack of pre-chiropractic college education would prevent his qualifying at this time. Since many of Dr. Terrans patients are from the Torrington area, there have been many letters received asking that Dr. Terrana be granted a license. A copy of Dr. Terranas examination grades from the New York board of chiropractic examiners was requested and received. At interview Dr. Terrana stated that he did not have any pre-chiropractic college as required by Connecticut statue. He stated that he had entered directly into the Columbia Institute of Chiropractic after his graduation from high school. He further stated that New York at that time did not require any pre-chiropractic requirements. He graduated from that institution in 1966. He was informed by members of our board that Connecticut requires candidates through certification to have the same educational back-ground as by examination. This board informed Dr. Terrana that his application would be reconsidered if he would aquire the two years of college or 60 semester hours of credits.

A letter of complaint had been received from a Robin M. Lane of 273 S. Main St., Cheshire, Ct. 06410. It concerned some x-ray negatives which she had brought to the office of Dr. Jeane Alexander. A letter requesting more detailed information from Robin Lane and Dr. Alexander was to be sent.

Correspondence was read.

Having concluded its business the board adjourned.

The Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners met in Wallingford on July 25, 1974 for a regularly scheduled meeting. Members present were Stephen E. Owens, Julius L. Sanna and Theodore J. Dombroski.

The Connecticut Chiropractic Association has recently challenged by court action a prior decision by the Attorney General in which chiropractors of Connecticut were denied use of laboratories for purposes of diagnosis. A telephone call had been received from Asst. Attorney General asking this board for back ground material. Copies of the original decision were made and forwarded to Attorney David Della Bitta.

A discussion concerning the acceptance by Connecticut for licensure consideration of chiropractors who have taken and passed the National Board of Chiropractic Examinations. At the present time there are 41 states who recognize the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. At the last meeting of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association, Drs Dombroski and Sanna had recommended that the C.C.A. submit legislation to amend the Healing Arts statute to grant recognition to the Diplomates of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. The Conn. Board of Chiropractic Examiners would continue to examine as is the usual custom.

A case review of Dr. Michael Swiller of Hartford to determine this boards position was discussed. No further word has been received from the office of the Connecticut Health Commissioner or the Attorney Generals office. This board is unable to proceed and the matter was tabled.

A review of colleges that are presently accepted by this board was made. A ruling by this board in November 1971 to accept graduates of colleges who have C.C.E. approval or its equivalent continues in effect. The Columbia Chiropractic College of New York and the Logan Chiropractic College have recently made application to the Council on Chiropractic Education. Inquiry will be made to the C.C.E. to determine the Status of these colleges to clarify if they are approved by the C.C.E.


The field of Accupuncture was reviewed and a determination was agreed to keep the subject open and tabled for further consideration depending on developments on a national basis.

The misunderstanding between a patient, Robin Lane and Dr. J. Alexander was discussed and settled.

The Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners met in a regularly scheduled meeting in Wallingford on November 21, 1974.

Members present were: Stephen E. Owens

This meeting which had been originally scheduled for October 31, 1974 was post-poned to allow its members to give testimony before the Common Pleas Court in Hartford. A subpoena had been issued by the Attorney Generals office requiring the secretary of this board to appear on October 31, 1974. The Secretary was requested to bring the examination questions for the years 1957 to date. The matter concerned use of laboratories by chiropractors for diagnostic purposes.

Correspondence -

A request had been sent to the Connecticut Healing Arts board asking for a review of their examinations by the National Chiropractic College. In an answer, dated September 27, 1974, Mr. Seymour St. John chairman, speaking for the Healing Arts Board refused. He stated that this would set precedent.

On September 5, 1974 a request for information concerning chiropractic colleges accreditation status was sent to Orval L. Hidde D.C. chairman of the Council on Chiropractic Education. IN his reply dated September 9, 1974 Dr. Hidde explained the various classifications namely 1. Correspondent: 2. Status: 3. Accredited. This request was as a result by the decision of the Department of H.E.W. The United States Department of Health, Education and Welfare in August 1974 had approved the Council on Chiropractic Education as the official Accrediting agency for chiropractic colleges.

After consideration of the above information, this board voted to re-affirm the November 1971 decision of the board and continue to accept for examination graduates of chiropractic colleges that are accredited or its equivalent, by the Council on Chiropractic Education. As of September 9, 1974 the following chiropractic colleges are accredited:

National Chiropractic College
Northwestern Chiropractic College
Los Angeles College of Chiropractic
Texas Chiropractic College
Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College (equivalent)

This board considered in depth the National Board of Chiropractic Examinations as administered by the National Examiners.

November 21, 1974

Regular meeting of the Conn. Board of Chiropractic Examiners:

A recommendation of the Department of Health, Education and Welfare for standardization of all examining board of all licensed health personal. The National Board of Chiropractic Examiners have achieved a high degree of acceptance by chiropractic examining boards. There is a national wide-spread movement to repeal basic science and Healing Arts Boards. As of June 1, 1973, 41 state boards of chiropractic examiners have recognized the National Boards. The National Board is given in two parts with Anatomy, Physiology, Chemistry, Pathology, Bacteriology, Hygiene-Sanitation-Public Health, taken in Part I; and Diagnosis, Gynecology, Obstetrics-Pediatrics, X-ray, Geriatrics, -Dermatology-Syphilology, Principles of Chiropractic, Jurisprudence-Ethics-Economics, taken in Part II. Physiotherapy is given as an elective. Successful candidates to Part I and Part II are awarded a Diplomate of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. In consideration of this information, this board voted to accept Diplomates of the National Board for licensure by certification, requiring their appearance before the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners for personal interview and professional qualifications with examinations in x-ray and x-ray interpretation, vertebral adjusting and vertebral palpation and dietetics. This would continue to insure a high quality of candidates for licensure consideration.

A letter outlining these requirements will be sent to the Connecticut Chiropractic Association.

Continuing education as a necessity for licensure renewal appears to be gaining approval in many health disciplines as well as in chiropractic licensing boards through out the nation. There have been two prior periods in which the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners have administered such a program. The statute requiring this measure was repealed in both instances.

A program for non-credit courses have been explored with Mr. Robert Baldwin, Assistant Director of post-graduate studies at the University of Connecticut. Further consideration for this type of study will be explored.

An application for licensure by certification from Dean Palmateer D.C. of Illinois was reviewed. His qualifications were accepted and voted to forward his name to the Division of Licensure. A personal interview of Dr. Palmateer had been conducted on October 31, 1974 in Hartford.

Regular meeting of the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners convened at 9:30 A.M. in Hartford, Connecticut. All members were present and are Stephen E. Swens D.C. - Julius L. Sanna D.C. - Theodore J. Dombroski D.C.

Dr. Owens had attended the NINDS workshop as an observer (National Institute of Neurological Diseases and Stroke) on the research status of Spinal Manipulation. This research symposium was funded by a grant through the department of Health - Education - Welfare. The meeting held in Bethesda, Maryland on February 2,3 and 4, 1975. Speakers from the United States and many foreign countries reported on the state of the art on manipulative spinal therapy or chiropractic spinal adjustment. Speakers represented chiropractic, osteopathic, medical and related fields.

The next matter of concern was of Dr. Michael Swiller of Hartford. A letter of Complaint had been received from a patient of Dr. Swiller by this board. Copies of the complaint were sent to the office of the Attorney General. A reply from Assistant Atty General stated that after interviewing the complainants, evidence did not warrant any action by that office. In reviewing Dr. Swiller's file it was noted of the many complaints and arrests for moral behavior and inability to act because of limitations in statutes. For this reason the board felt a discussion should be sought with the Health Commissioner. Dr. Owen was asked to contact Dr. Lloyd and review the file of Dr. Swiller.

A letter of Complaint from Salvatore D'Amico, 664 High St., Middletown, Conn. 10645, concerning Dr. Patrick Labbadia, Middletown, Conn., was read. A reply was decided, asking Mr. D'Amico to meet with us at a special meeting to discuss his problem in detail.

A newspaper article written by staff reporter, Ned Thomas in a New Haven publication in which Dr. Julius Timmoner was quoted as using a variation of accupuncture. This board felt that a conflict with chiropractic practice might be involved. A letter telling Dr. Timmoner to cease and desist from pursuing this procedure. He would be further be asked to appear at our next meeting to discuss this matter.

Regular meeting of the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met on May 6, 1975 in Danbury. Members present were Stephen F. Owens D.C., Julius L. Sanna D.C., Theodore J. Dombroski D.C.

A written chiropractic, oral and practical examination was conducted for Angelo N. Della Rippa of Wethersfield, Conn. Dr. Della Rippa had recently passed the Healing Arts examination. Upon completion of all portions Dr. Della Rippa was excused.

The board then met with Julian R. Timmoner D.C. of New Haven concerning a complaint. On February 14, 1975 a letter was received from Commissioner of Health Douglas Lloyd concerning a violation of General Statutes 20-24. This was based on a complaint by Peter Schioppo D.C., of 633 Orange Street, New Haven on acupuncture. It related to an article which appeared in the New Haven Register, a daily newspaper on February 2, 1975. The article was written by a staff reporter Ned Thomas who interviewed Dr. Timmoner. Dr. Timmoner stated that he has had an interest in the subject of acupuncture and has read many books and articles as well as attended demonstrations and lectures. He further stated that after some office discussions, Ned Thomas called for an interview. In the discussion terms of acupuncture, acupressure, trigger points were used and the article which appeared was written from this interview. Dr. Timmoner was asked if he edited a copy of the article before publication. He said that he had not. After further discussion this board felt that editorial privileges had been used with mis-use of the terms. It was suggested to Dr. Timmoner that he proof-read any such articles and have them sanctioned by the Connecticut Chiropractic Association. The board also discussed with Dr. Timmoner the definition of Chiropractic as it appears in chapter 372, Sec. 20-24.

Dr. Owens reported that he had met with Dr. Barrett, asst. Commissioner of Health concerning Michael Swiller of Hartford. Numerous complaints have been received which have been reviewed by this board and by the Attorney General's office. The Attorney General's office has stated that legal evidence was lacking to proceed with action based on the complaints. A suggestion was made to keep compiling the file on Dr. Swiller.

continuation of May 6, 1975 Board of Chiropractic Examiners meeting.

A review of colleges whose graduates will be accepted for examination was next considered. Since the Department of Health, Education and Welfare has recognized the Council on Chiropractic Education which is the only accrediting agency for chiropractic colleges. This board has taken a position in the past to accept graduates of chiropractic colleges that are accredited by the Council on Chiropractic Education, or its equivalent. This designation might cause some confusion so that a change was voted to accept graduates of chiropractic colleges that are a 'Recognized Candidate for Accreditation'. Since this board has voted to accept the Policies of the Council on Chiropractic Education and Accreditation, the difficulties of inspection and evaluation of colleges would be financially beneficial to Connecticut.

The letter of complaint concerning Patrick Labbadia D.C., of Middletown was closed. On January 30, 1975 a letter of complaint was received from Salvatore D'Amico. On March 12, 1975 in a telephone conversation Mr. D'Amico asked that no further action be taken. On April 5, 1975 a letter was sent to Mr. D'Amico stating that this board would meet in Danbury on May 6, 1975 asking for further instructions. Since no word was received the matter was dropped.

Having completed its business for the day the board adjourned.

The Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners Convened at a regularly scheduled meeting in Hartford at 79 Elm Street. The meeting was called to order at 2:00 P.M. with Stephen E. Owens and Theodore J. Dombroski present. Dr. Richard E. Vincent, secretary to the Massachusetts Board of Chiropractic Examiners was present by invitation.

The board first discussed the implementation of the examinations to be held in October 1975. This would be the first examination by this board after statutory elimination of the Basic Science examining board. Discussion centered upon requirements for an all inclusive written, oral and practical coverage of the basic sciences and chiropractic knowledge.

The question whether to grant full consideration for acceptance to 'Diplomates' of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. Dr. Vincent was able to contribute background information on this question since the Massachusetts Board of Chiropractic Examiners have had experience with many candidates holding this qualification. Their solution was to grant recognition, reserving the board right to examine in any or all subjects and clinical competency. Since this suggestion appeared sound this board voted to adopt and utilize this procedure.

The board next interviewed Mr Salvatore D'Amico, 66 1/2 High Street, Middletown, who had asked permission to speak. His complaint concerned Dr. Patrick Labbadia, 210 S. Main Street, Middletown by whom he had been treated. He was unable to secure a report of his x-rays and physical examination to establish a claim for physical disability he suffered in a automobile accident September 6, 1968. A letter will be sent to Dr. Labbadia asking that he furnish Mr. D'Amico with information of the examination and report of the x-rays taken in May of 1973. (5/11/73 -5/14/73)

A request had been recieved from the Federation of Chiropractic Examining Boards to adopt by administrative regulation wherein it will be provided that all applicants for licensure who matriculated in a chiropractic college after October 1, 1975 must present evidence of having graduated from a chiropractic college having Status with the accrediting Commission of the Council on Chiropractic Education Inc.

A vote by this board was in favor of this resolution.

A letter from the Commissioner of Health asking this board to act on a complaint by a Mr Crawford Kus, 86 Grandview Street, Tolland in which he was charged \$25.00 for an examination and treatment by Walter Sorensen D.C., 30 LaFayette Square, Rockville, Conn.

Letters have been sent to Mr. Kus and Dr Sorensen asking for additional information. Replies have not been received at the time of this meeting.

He further stated Dr. Sorensen holds a 'Diplomate' in chiropractic orthopedics which requires five years of post graduate study in an appropriate college and necessity to pass an examination before this award is granted.

Dr. Owens submitted a letter of complaint from S. Mark Guk, Pond Meadow Road, Killingworth concerning Dr. Edward Grealease in which an agreed amount of \$45.00 for x-rays was later billed as \$90.00 Letters will be sent to seek additional information.

Having concluded its business for the day the board voted to adjourn.

An item in a Canton newspaper had been mailed to this board by Dr. Stephen Owen of Hartford. The article stated that Drs Michael J. Swiller and Peter G. Maskell of Canton had attended a training seminar in Louisiana. Since Peter G. Maskell is not licensed as a chiropractor in Connecticut, Dr. Paul was asked to gather information for further board consideration.

A complaint by Mark S. Guk of Pond Meadow Road, Killingworth Conn., concerning an x-ray overcharge at the office of Edward J. Crealesse D.C., of Middletown. Dr Crealesse stated in a letter that examination required x-rays of the lumbar spine and a Davis series of the cervical spine. The board voted to ask permission of Dr. Crealesse to review the x-ray films taken of Mr. Guk.

The next matter for consideration was a request by Commissioner of Health Lloyd to investigate a complaint by Crawford Kus of 86 Grandview Street, Tolland, of an overcharge by Walter Sorensen D.C. of Rockville, Conn. An inquiry was sent by this board to Mr. Kus and also to Dr. Sorensen. On July 14, 1975 Mr. Kus and Dr. Sorensen were contacted by telephone. On August 4, 1975 Mr. Kus submitted a letter along with copies of billing statements from Dr. Sorensen. In brief Mr. Kus was seeking a chiropractic adjustment and did not wish an examination. Dr. Sorensen submitted a two page narrative report of the initial examination. Dr. Sorensen stated that his usual and customary procedure require an examination before treatment is given on the initial visit. Considering this information this board felt the charge justified. Letter will be sent to Mr. Guk, Dr. Sorensen and a report to the Health Commissioner.

Also under consideration for some months in which Salvatore D'Amico of Middletown complained against Patrick Labbadia D.C. of Middletown. Mr D'Amico had been treated by Dr. Labbadia in 1973 for a spinal problem resulting from a 1968 automobile accident. Mr D'Amico had also been treated by five medical practitioners. The settlement was made in April 1975 by Mr. D'Amico's attorney. Mr. D'Amico's complaint concerned x-ray information to establish a permanent disability claim. Dr. Labbadia in his report on September 18, 1975 to this board stated that he had complied with all requests by Mr D'Amico for information regarding his condition including examinations, prognosis, and x-ray reports to Mr. D'Amico and his attorney and to the State Department of Education Bureau of Disability determination. Considering these facts this board felt no evidence existed which would involve Dr. Labbadia's practice of chiropractic and inform Mr. D'Amico to seek legal advice if he wished to pursue this further.

The board then considered the format for the examination of candidates for licensure on October 30, 1975. Since the Board of Healing Arts examination will be repealed on October 1, 1975 an unusual number of applicants are expected. This requires an examination in the basic sciences in addition to other statutory required subjects written, oral and practical. A suitable site for this examination such as a state educational facility was to be investigated

Additional considerations are required in preparation it was decided to hold the next meeting the following week.

A discussion to re-schedule examination dates to coincide with graduating classes. A schedule to agree with all colleges would be extremely difficult as college completions and graduating exercises varied.


A selection of questions for the oral, practical, chiropractic technique, orthopedic and x-ray was made. Zerox copies were to be made to supply candidates at the next examination.





First order of business was review of a letter referred to this office regarding the conduct of Dr. Nicholas Bruce of 366 Chase Parkway, Waterbury, Connecticut, from Miss Beth Lauretano, 95 Litchfield Street, Thomaston, Connecticut, regarding the patient's complaints of unethical conduct on the part of Dr. Bruce. After review of a letter from Miss Lauretano and statements from Dr. Bruce, it was the opinion of the Board that there was no unethical conduct on the part of Dr. Bruce and, therefore, no disciplinary action would be taken and both parties involved will be notified of this decision.

The Secretary was asked to notify Secretary of State of the four regular meetings scheduled for 1976-77, two examination meetings prior to Boards to be given at University of Connecticut Health Center and a July organizational meeting. 
The Board has reviewed a complaint that the group of Chiropractors and Natureopaths in the Glastonbury area are using the term "Natural Health Physicians" may be in violation of the Law and, therefore, the Secretary of the Board will call or write to gather further information and render a decision.

The Sunset Review Legislative hearings will be held on September 20, 1979, and Dr. Dombroski and Dr. Paul will give testimony on that date.

Board requested information from the Sherman College of South Carolina in regards to their application for approval of their students and licensure in Connecticut. Upon the information being made available to us by the Sherman College of Chiropractic, it was the decision of this Board that the Sherman students did not qualify for application for licensure at this time and we will notify them of this decision.

Board reviewed numerous letters pertaining to other matters, and answered requests for information regarding Chiropractic. The Board adjourned at 11 p. m.

1. The Sherman College had been repeatedly denied approval by the National Accrediting Chiropractic Agency, The Council on Chiropractic Education "CCE". Review of correspondence regarding their reason for this denial has been a failure of the Sherman College to upgrade its educational program to an acceptable level and not due to any philosophical position.
2. The Board also reviewed information regarding the Sherman College position on diagnosis and agree it is unacceptable and untenable position and is contrary to accepting Chiropractic in Connecticut. The opinion of the Board is that diagnosis is an integral part of standard Chiropractic procedures and is used not only to determine which cases should be treated, but just as importantly what cases should not be treated and should be referred to other members of the Healing Arts.


The Board reviewed the applications of eighteen candidates who will be taking the Board given on October 27, 28, 1979, at the University of Connecticut Medical Facility in Farmington. The Board discussed request from the Connecticut Chiropractic Association to change dates of the Examination to more compatible dates of college graduation. After discussion, it was agreed to give the examinations in June and January rather than April and October. The Board voted to cancel the April Examination until June, 1980, and will set a definite date in the future. 





The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met in a regular meeting at 3466 Main St., Stratford on April 15, 1980.

Present were George J. Paul D.C. of E. Hartford, Dorothy C. Kowalski of Farmington and Theodore J. Dombroski D.C. of Stratford.

The board re-considered in detail the application of the Sherman College of Straight Chiropractic, Spartanburg, South Carolina. This college had made application to this board in 1979 to allow its graduates approval for licensure examination.

On September 11, 1979 at a regular meeting in Middletown, board members Drs Theodore J. Dombroski, George J. Paul and Patrick A. Labbadia considered the application and denied approval based on board opinion that its graduates did not qualify.

On October 16, 1979 at a regular meeting in Middletown, board members Drs Theodore J. Dombroski, George J. Paul and Patrick A. Labbadia again considered the application of the Sherman College and listed reasons for its denial, based primarily on Sherman College position on diagnosis, the details being noted in the board minutes of that meeting. (page 69)

The board minutes of those two dates, September 11, 1979 and October 16, 1979 make no mention of the Sherman College inspection and approval by the International Chiropractors Association. (ICA)

At the next board meeting October 30, 1979 information was received that Dorothy C. Kowalski, a public member would replace Patrick A. Labbadia D.C.

The re-consideration of the Sherman College application on April 15, 1980, reconstruction in chronological order was necessary to acquaint Dorothy C. Kowalski, the new public member, with available information relative to the approval of colleges for Connecticut. Reviewed were Chapter 372 Section 20-26 as to officers of the board and duties. Also reviewed were board regulations Sec 209-4 dealing with school approval.

For licensure approval this board adopted a rule in 1947 to use the National Chiropractic Association which in 1964 became the American Chiropractic Association. (ACA) Its accrediting agency, the Council on Chiropractic Education (CCE), was separated into a self sustaining organization, maintained a continuity but assumed a more responsible role in college accreditation. The ACA (formerly NCA) no longer assumed the responsibility for school inspection, delegating that duty to the CCE, which had cleaved from the ACA (NCA). This board rule was re-evaluated periodically and is so noted in board minutes on pages 4, 16, 27 and 69 as well as in earlier recorded minute books.

In 1973 the CCE was selected as the accrediting agency for all chiropractic colleges by the United States Office of Education (HEW).

In August 1952 the International Chiropractors Association created as their accrediting agency the Chiropractic Education Commission which later became the Association of Chiropractic Colleges (ACC).

With the approval by the United States Office of Education for the CCE to become the accrediting agency for all chiropractic colleges, prompted the colleges which until this time had affiliated with the Association of Chiropractic Colleges (ACC), (the accrediting agency for the ICA), to seek accreditation with the CCE.

Since the ICA had designated the ACC to be its accrediting agency and had lost its members to the CCE, the validity of the September 1975 approval of the Sherman College is clouded. Was the chiropractic education commission (ACC) of the ICA functioning as a valid agency at this date.

On November 29, 1979, a request for a copy of the minutes relative to the boards decision concerning the Sherman College was received, by certified mail, from William Martin D.C. of Danbury. A copy of the board minutes for October 16, 1979 was mailed on December 6, 1979.

On December 3, 1979 a request was received by certified mail for the same information from Gregory L. Anderson D.C. of Brookfield. The board minutes for October 16, 1979 was sent December 6, 1979.

On January 8, 1980 a request was received from Sherman College president, T.A. Gelardi D.C., for board minutes of September 1979. A copy of the September 1979 board minutes were sent January 17, 1980.

By several telephone conversations (1/8/80 and 1/9/80) and (several) letters, a request was granted on January 17, 1980 to Jay and Judith Berke of Inman, South Carolina, to attend the July 15, 1980 meeting of the board concerning their ability as Sherman graduates to take the Connecticut examination for licensure.

On January 25, 1980 a letter was received from Attorney Francis Collins of Danbury, representing William Martin D.C., stating that this board had not followed its regulations in its decision on October 16, 1979. A copy of this letter was sent to Attorney Lynch (AG office) on January 29, 1980 for direction. On February 8, 1980 Asst. Attorney Gen. Lynch answered, and suggested this board request an official opinion from the office of the AG to determine the validity of the October 16, 1979 ruling by the board of Chiropractic Examiners. This request was sent to Asst. Atty. Lynch on February 12, 1980, along with additional information on this boards approval procedures since 1947 and the necessity for using such an agency (CCE), since approval for out of state travel was not allowed because of budgetary restrictions.

On March 12, 1980, a letter was received from Atty. Collins requesting an answer to his January 25, 1980 letter. A copy of this letter was sent to Atty. Gen Lynch.

On March 18, 1980, the application of William Martin D.C. was received by certified mail. It was returned by certified mail.

A letter, dated March 27, 1980, containing the opinion of the

Attorney General was received April 2, 1980. It had been mailed to Middletown thus necessitating redirection to Stratford, accounting for the delay. However other mail from the Attorney Generals office had been mailed to the correct address. In his letter the Attorney General stated that this board should reconsider the application of the Sherman College.

In a letter received on April 3, 1980, Attorney Collins states in his opinion, after reading the Attorney Generals report, he advised his client, William Martin D.C., to refile his application with the Chiropractic Examining Board.

The application of William Martin D.C., delivered by certified mail, was not accepted April 5, 1980, since no determination had been made to date, concerning the Sherman College.

On April 4, 1980, a letter was sent by this board to the International Chiropractors Association (ICA) to determine when the inspection of the Sherman College had been made, and whether subsequent inspections were made as required.

On April 4, 1980 a letter was sent to Attorney Collins stating that the Sherman College application would be re-considered at the next board meeting.

A letter, dated April 8, 1980, from Attorney Collins contained the application of William Martin D.C. Attorney Collins stated the application was being submitted for reconsideration at our next meeting.

A letter written by Sherman College president T.A. Gelardi D.C. on April 8, 1980 informed this board he was in possession of the Attorney Generals opinion. He enclosed a copy indicating, that the Sherman College was inspected and approved by the ICA in September 1975.

The board noted that the inspection and approval had been made September 1975 by the ICA. Section 20-26-5 of the Regulations of Connecticut State Agencies provides in part that the board shall make periodic examinations to ascertain that schools, once approved maintain such standards.

Chapter 327, Section 20-27 states in part that the secretary shall file annually with the State Department of Health, a list of chiropractic colleges or institutions recognized by said board as legal and reputable.

The board concluded from these two sections that statute and regulations require yearly periodic inspection or recertification by an accrediting agency.

The board reviewed a report from the Sherman Bulletin, Volume 3 Number 1, January 1980 in which the South Carolina legislature gave the South Carolina Commission on Higher Education the authority to approve an accrediting agency other than the CCE. The Sherman College could apply to this agency. The bill was signed on January 22, 1980 which allows the 16 member commission on higher education six(6) months in which to approve an alternate accrediting agency for chiropractic institutions. Sherman would then have one year to achieve the first level of accreditation(candidate status). Connecticut board rule requires RECOGNIZED CANDIDATE STATUS which is the second or intermediate level referred to as RCA STATUS.

The board will seek further information from the CCE and its relations with the Sherman College.

The Board will write for similar information from the American Chiropractic Association(NCA).

The Board will seek further information from the Sherman College if it has been re-examined since September 1975.

Upon receipt and review of the above information this board will be able to make its determination accordingly as required by regulation and statute.

The board directed to return the application of William Martin D.C. to Attorney Collins.

In reviewing advertisements that had been sent to this board, it was determined that our board has no regulation which concerns itself to this issue. This matter will be investigated and regulations will be promulgated to deal with this matter. The examination of several ads indicate the use of terms, statements and claims which seem beyond the present scope of practice.



The Board considered the recommendation of the Department to rescind some of its present regulations which the Department feels have been superceded by Sections 20-27 and 20-28 of the General Statutes. The Board felt that Sections 20-26-1, 2, 4 and 5, have been superceded but 20-26-3 should be retained or added to the new regulations that the Board is preparing for adoption.

3. Applicants would be questioned by the consultants or Board members only.
4. The Board will continue to provide examination questions because of better control, security, adaptability and decreased cost to the Department.

The next examination is being scheduled for the latter part of January 1982.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met on December 10, 1981 in Farmington. Members present were Dorothy Kowalski, Drs. Paul and Dombroski.

Dr. Dombroski reported on the Semi-Annual Conference of District #3 of the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards which was held at the New York Chiropractic College, Old Brookville, New York, on November 7, 1981.

The Delegates were conducted on a tour through the new anatomy building which was followed by a welcoming address by Dr. Napolitano, President of the NYCC and is now serving as Vice-President of the CCE.

His topic covered SCSA and post secondary education. He stated that 38 states have adopted CCE standards.

Dr. Vincent reported on the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. A request had been made to conduct three examinations per year which was turned down as too costly. Gordon Homan, D.C., Executive Director, retired effective November 1, 1981.

Dr. Sol Goldschmidt reported results of a questionnaire to all states. A clinical competence examination is being developed seeking standardization. At present there is a great variation in content, grading, role of examiners and material covered.

The annual meeting of the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards will be held February 10-14, 1982 in Atlanta, Georgia.

The Board discussed the next examination for licensure to be held January 23-24, 1982 at the University of Connecticut Health Center in Farmington.

An Ad-Hoc Committee, representing the Connecticut Chiropractic Association was formed as a result of a request of Steve Harriman, Director, of the Medical Quality Assurance Division of the Department of Health Services.

The Ad-Hoc Committee had met with Gary DeWitt, Ph.D., Examination Coordinator, in which an agreement was reached to accept results of the National Board.

Dr. Dombroski reported results of his meeting with Dr. DeWitt on December 8, 1981. At this meeting, a National Board examination was discussed which could replace our present written examination. Also proposed by Dr. DeWitt, was acceptance of National Board results, previously taken by candidates, thus eliminating the state's written examination and then having a one day examination in clinical competency covering O/N, x-ray interpretation, Cl/Tech, and personal interview.

In discussing this matter, the Board had reservations to consider this procedure at this time as too abrupt a change from our present format which could be confusing to candidates who have already been otherwise informed and conflicting with present arrangements. The Board, although not directly involved in licensing procedures, is concerned with its application and would withhold opinion until a meeting with the Department may clarify the issue.

The Board then considered "Basic Science Certificate of Proficiency" as used in Sec. 20-27(c) for the purpose of licensure without examination. Dr. Dombroski reported that Dr. DeWitt is seeking an AG opinion concerning this matter.

The Board then discussed subject material, procedure and content of the Practical examination. This portion of the examination must be maintained as a strong determining factor in Clinical Competency. The Clinical Competency portion of the Connecticut examination has always been a fair and equitable factor in determining candidates' qualifications.

A vote was made to adjourn.

This examination was a departure from previous examinations in that Diplomate Certificates from the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners were accepted in lieu of the written portion of the examination. Prior methods of evaluating final grades were no longer applicable. An agreement between the Board and Dr. DeWitt resolved this obstacle. At this same meeting held on January 7, 1982 in which the NBCE Diplomate Certificates were agreed upon, other licensure procedures such as licensure by credentials or reciprocity were discussed. This matter was tabled for later meetings to determine more exacting regulations.

By reviewing the final scores, the Board in agreement with the examination coordinator determined that the passing criteria would be no less than an average of 75% with no score below 60. A 75% is the usual passing score for any of the examinations administered.

At a meeting with Atty. Gen. Richard Lynch on January 28, 1982 it was his opinion that since statute permits its use, examination in physiotherapy would be allowable.

This would require that the subject of physiotherapy credit would be required under the National Board of Chiropractic Examination Diplomate certificate.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners, Drs. George Paul and Theodore J. Dombroski met with Dr. Gary DeWitt during a regular meeting on April 5, 1982 in Hartford.

The purpose of the meeting was to establish rules for upcoming examinations concerning passing scores and examinations, the next which will be held June 26, and 27, 1982. Since a "Diplomate Status" of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners has been accepted by this Board and the Health Department, a one day session will be held on June 26, 1982 for the practical examination in orthopedics/neurology, clinical competence/technique and spinal x-ray interpretation as well as personal interviews by the Chiropractic Board of Examiners.

At the last examination which had been held January 23, 1982 an agreed minimum criteria for passing was 75% in all three examinations. Final tabulations established that eleven out of a total of forty had passed. The results indicated that this criteria was difficult. After the examination, several meetings with the Department were held, but retro-active rule changes could not alter the results. Candidates who had failed were allowed to ask for a review of their scores, if they felt entitled to do so, with a review by the Department and the Board of Examiners.

The Board, in agreement with Dr. Gary DeWitt, Examination Coordinator, have agreed for upcoming examinations that passing requirements shall be an average of 75% across all three examinations with no score below 60%. It will be necessary to repeat the entire examination for scores below this level.

Discussion by Board members and Dr. DeWitt determined that rules that had been agreed upon between this Board and the Department should not be influenced or altered by other sources since statute requires that licensing, although done by the Department, requires "advice and consent by the board of examiners".

The Board and Dr. DeWitt discussed the establishment of an item pool for upcoming examinations. Dr. Grimmeisen, President of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association, at the request of Dr. DeWitt, has asked the following doctors to develop questions for this item pool:

Drs. Donald Salamone and Donald Lawler - orthopedics/neurology

Drs. John Balkum and Paul Grimmeisen - spinal x-ray interpretation

Drs. Lewis Labbadia and Marino Passaro - clinical competence/technique

Item questions developed by this group will be reviewed by the Board. Questions from the January 23, 1982 examination will be placed in this item pool and a selection of questions for each examination may be used in upcoming examinations.

A discussion by Board members and Dr. DeWitt centered upon the make-up of the ad hoc committee. Ad hoc committees, as developed by the Department, should equally represent each profession or discipline. Dr. DeWitt was asked by the board to contact Dr. Grimmeisen, current president of the CCA, for an opinion on this question, since the present chiropractic ad hoc

committee only represents the present executive board and not other members of the association or non-members but who practice in Connecticut.

Details of licensure by credentials or reciprocity were not considered at this meeting. The matter will have to be considered at the next combined meeting between the Board and the Department of Health.

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The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met on June 3, 1982 at the Health Department in Hartford with Dr. Gary DeWitt.

For consideration were license applications by examination and credentials. The applications of candidates by examination will be reviewed during the licensure examination on June 26, 1982. There are thirty eight (38) applicants.

The twelve 12 applications by credentials were reviewed which produced several questions that required clarification. The Board was concerned whether the states from which the applicants were applying, would grant the same consideration for our state licensee's. It was decided to write and seek an answer concerning this question.

A number of applicants from New York, who had just received their licenses there, had also applied. The question arose that these candidates have never established a practice there, or was their intent to circumvent the Connecticut practical examination for licensure.

The Board discussed the advantages of a waiting period where a licensee had to practice for a five (5) year period before he or she was eligible for licensure consideration in Connecticut. A regulation of this type would control such applications and protect the value of a Connecticut license.

The Board reviewed the list of examiners to assist at the June 26, 1982 examination. A group of twelve (12) examiners would be required due to the number of candidates.

The Board received copies of proposed pool questions that will be used in the examinations in Neuro-diagnosis and Practice and Principles. These questions will be reviewed and any corrections or comments will be returned to Dr. DeWitt.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met on August 31, 1982 at the State Department of Health in Hartford. Members present were Drs. George Paul and Theodore J. Dombroski. Representing the Health Department was Gary W. DeWitt, Ph.D., Examination Coordinator, Division of Medical Quality Assurance.

Also meeting with Dr. DeWitt, at the same meeting, were members of the ad hoc committee of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association. Present were Drs. Gremmeisen, Hartney, Passaro and Harry Sproviero.

Attorney Robert Hirtle, legal counsel for the CCA, was also present.

The major interest at the meeting was issuing of licenses without examination which is covered under Connecticut General Statutes, Chapter 372, Sec. 20-27, par. (a), (b), (c). Discussion centered upon interpretation. It was the concern of the chiropractic representation that many candidates were applying for licensure by credentials to circumvent the Connecticut examination. Interpretation of the statutes differed by the Department from that of the Board of Examiners. The Board of Examiners were concerned with their responsibility to ensure qualified practitioners for licensure into the Connecticut Health Delivery system. An additional concern was the statutory definition of "Basic Science certificate" as used in Sec. 20-27, par. (c).

Attorney Hirtle presented Dr. DeWitt with a copy of proposed regulations which would help clarify these issues. An agreement was made to allow the Department, primarily Steve Harriman and Gary DeWitt, to study these regulations and re-convene in about two weeks.

The meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met on October 14, 1982 in Hartford at the Department of Health Services.

Members present were Drs. George Paul and Theodore Dombroski. This meeting was a continuation of a meeting which had been held on August 31, 1982.

Also present were Drs. Edward Hartney, Marino Passero, Harry Sproviero and Paul Gremmeisen who represented the ad hoc committee of the Connecticut Chiropractic Association.

Attorney David Heinlein represented Robert Hirtle, Counsel, for the Connecticut Chiropractic Association.

Steven Harriman and Gary DeWitt represented the Department of Health.

In his letter of September 27, 1982, Steven Harriman disapproved most of the proposed regulation submitted by Attorney Hirtle for the Connecticut Chiropractic Association and endorsed by the Board of Chiropractic Examiners.

Discussion concerning licensure without examination resulted with the Department and the chiropractic profession in similar positions as of the August 31, 1982 meeting.

The two meetings have not resolved the following:

1. "Practicing chiropractor" as used in Sec. 20-27(c).
2. "Substantially similar or higher than" relative to credentialing.
3. Statutes in other states in which scope of practice is not similar to Connecticut and is reflected in their examinations.
4. The granting of a license to Debra Weiss, D.C., by credentials after having failed the Connecticut licensure examination on two separate occasions. Sec. 20-27(c) mandates competency as a requirement for licensure.

No progress was made at this meeting.

The meeting was adjourned.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met in Farmington on November 18, 1982. Members present were Dorothy Kowalski, Drs. George Paul and Theodore J. Dombroski.

The Board discussed the physiotherapy requirement in licensure applicants' credentials. Many applicants have made inquiries whether this requirement applied to them. The Board had recommended the physiotherapy requirement in its February 23, 1982 meeting. This was based on Attorney General Lynch's opinion that since physiotherapy is included in the practice act, an examination in that subject was in order. This would be brought to the attention of the Department. The Board will notify all approved chiropractic colleges to allow candidates to prepare themselves. The applicants' credentials will be examined at the January 1983 examination for this requirement and the rule will be enforced starting with the June 1983 examination.

The State Board Delegate and Member Newsletter from the NBCE states in Vol. 1, no. 3, November 1982: "Physiotherapy is an elective. An applicant must successfully complete, prior to application closing date, 120 hours in the subject taught by a chiropractic college whose students are eligible to take the NBCE exams, or in a course certified by such a college."

An application for licensure has been under consideration for George Langlitz, D.C. The Board was unanimous in its decision that the original application was fraudulently submitted and was reason for refusal.

Dr. Paul submitted a newspaper ad which appeared in the Hartford Courant, Sunday, November 14, 1982, which had been placed by Alan Butkowsky, D.C., of 42 Wells Road, Wethersfield, CT. The concern relative to this ad is covered under Sec. 20-29 which states in part: "engaging in fraud or material deception in the course of professional services." The Board's concern was to separate business practice from deceitful and deceptive professional practice, in which the wording of the ad contained two separate statements amounting to a bait and switch tactic. A letter will be sent to Dr. Butkowsky asking for an explanation.

A letter of inquiry had been received from Peter G. Luecken, D.C. of Fairfield, whether he could employ an unlicensed chiropractor in his office. Since there are no provisions under our present statute for a preceptorship program, the Board felt such an arrangement would be a violation. Sec. 20-27, par. (c) states in part: "any person desiring to practice chiropractic shall make application to the department."

An inquiry had been received from Murray Cruickshank, D.C. of Bridgeport whether the Canadian Memorial Chiropractic College was on the approved list for chiropractic colleges. The 1982-1983 Directory from the Chiropractic Examining Boards published by the Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Boards list the CMCC as a 'Recognized Candidate for Accreditation' by reciprocal agreement with the CCE-Canada. The Department will be notified that CMCC is now on the approved list of chiropractic colleges.

The Board, in a lengthy discussion, wishes to be on record to show disagreement and disappointment that a license to practice chiropractic was granted to an individual, by credentials, who had failed the Connecticut licensure examination on two separate occasions. Sec. 20-27, par. (b) states in part: "no person shall receive a license until he has passed an examination prescribed by the department of health services with the advice and

consent of the board of chiropractic examiners." Par. (c) states in part: "the department of health services may grant a license without examination to currently practicing, competent licensees from any other state whose licensure requirement is substantially similar or higher than those of this state." The key words in this section are 'currently practicing, competent, and substantially similar.'

The Board minutes were approved. It has always been a Board custom to supply members with a copy of Board minutes.

The purpose of this meeting was to make final determinations for the licensure examination that had been held on January 22, 1983.

Copies of this Board's minutes of February 3, 1983 were sent to Dr. George Paul, Dorothy Kowalski and the Department of Health.

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners, with the assistance of nineteen (19) practicing doctors of chiropractics, whose names appeared in the January 22, 1983 Board minutes, examined sixty-four (64) applicants for chiropractic licenses. As a result, final determination shows that thirty-eight (38) passed and twenty-six (26) failed.

A list compiled by the Department of Health March 9, 1983 incorrectly listed Steven David Patt, D.C. as having passed the examination. Dr. Patt had achieved a 74 average which is one (1) point below the passing required level and should not have been included. He further achieved a score of 57 in x-ray, which further eliminates him from the passing criteria.

There was one (1) additional error in the final tabulations. For candidate #83142, Mirriam Mitchell, the final average should have been 63.8 and not 69.8. Since both scores indicated a failure, noting the error was a technicality.

STATE BOARD OF CHIROPRACTIC EXAMINERS
MINUTES APRIL 5, 1983

Drs. George Paul and Theodore Dombroski, members of the Board of Chiropractic Examiners, met on April 5, 1983 at the State Department of Health Services in Hartford. Representing the Health Department were Drs. Elise Kremer, Examination Coordinator and Gary DeWitt, Assistant Director.

Copies of the board minutes of March 14, 1983, the last meeting, were sent to the Health Department and board members Paul and Kowalski. The purpose of this meeting was to finalize the results of the January 22, 1983 licensure examination.

At the January 22, 1983 examination there had been four examination two-man teams, in O/N, Cl/T and one x-ray team consisting of two examiners. One examiner, Dr. Cianciolo, did not participate as he left early.

All scores were balanced as to assure equality for all candidates. Several candidates that had failed by a close margin had asked for a review of their examination scores. Since there had been a readjustment of final scores, an agreement was made by board members and the department that no further review was necessary.

An error, in the x-ray score transcription for a failed candidate Allen Comen, D.C., determined that he should have been a passing candidate. The department will notify him to that effect.

A discussion on alternative examination procedures in which an examination team, consisting of examiners in each subject was explored. This would require three examiners, one in O/N, one in Cl/T and one in X/R. A Pass/Fail criteria rather than the present averaging of subjects was discussed.

A suggestion by Gary DeWitt that all members of the examination team would meet after the examination to compare results after all candidates were examined was discussed. This would help to solve many problems that presently must be done by mail.

The board will compile a group of new questions for consideration at upcoming examinations.

STATE BOARD OF CHIROPRACTIC EXAMINERS
MINUTES MAY 12, 1983

The Board of Chiropractic Examiners met on May 12, 1983 in East Hartford. Members present were Drs. George J. Paul and Theodore J. Dombroski.

Copies of the meeting of April 5, 1983, the last meeting, were sent to Board members George Paul, D.C., and Dorothy Kowalski, as well as the Department of Health.

The Board discussed contemplated changes in licensure examination procedures in which a three member examining group would totally evaluate a candidate. This evaluation would consider all phases of orthopedics/neurology, x-ray (spinal), chiropractic technique, and clinical competency. The examination team would make a final judgement of pass or fail determination for each candidate. This type of format has been under consideration and discussion by the Board and at Board meetings with members of the Health Department.

At a workshop meeting held on April 28, 1983 in Meriden, Gary DeWitt, Ph.D., Assistant Director, represented the Health Department; Theodore J. Dombroski, D.C., the Board of Examiners; and Peter Lawler, D.C., Marino Passaro, D.C., Vincent Perri, D.C., Peter Zilahy, D.C., composed the group from the Connecticut Chiropractic Association. Dr. DeWitt introduced a security agreement paper that each examiner would sign to maintain maximum security. The workshop group developed a stem type question which would require detailed inquiry of the candidate. The candidate would be presented with a typical patient problem complaint as is encountered in daily practice. The candidate would then be responsible for the data gathering to include a complete case history and examination arriving at the working diagnosis after considering the pathophysiology, differential diagnosis. He would then be required to determine the action, outline the treatment, allowable under statute, or referral for appropriate treatment if required.

Additional meetings will be held by this combined group to develop additional material.

Since this type of question will be lengthy and considering that examination candidates respond differently, the Board feels that with this type of procedure, only one such question be used at this examination. An additional question (one each) on orthopedics/neurology, technique/clinical competency, and a x-ray series be given. This procedure would allow a transitional format for this examination and an evaluation can be determined following the examination.

An early report indicates that a large group is applying for licensure examination, therefore some standardization is required both for the examiners and candidates.

Methods to improve and maintain security were discussed. Security will be improved with the proposed change in examination as contact between candidates in the process of examination will be decreased. The applicants will be escorted from the area immediately after their examination is completed. The Board will also observe members of the examining teams in the process of examinations.

Seven (7) examinations were reviewed with candidates number 34, 82, 83, 19, 28, 62 and 38. They were reviewed by number in order to insure confidentiality of names. All examinations reviewed were found to be correct and no changes were made in the pass/fail status of each of these candidates.





The meeting was called to order at 1:40 p.m., with Dr. Passero, Dr. Kremer, and Dr. Labbadia present. Initial discussion was made to previous examinations and request for review of examinations by the applicants. Review of the examination was made, and the outcome revealed error in the scoring of four applicants. They will be notified of the status by the Department of Health. Next examination date is January 13, 1985.

Dr. Rosenbluth presented with a request for licensure. The applicant had taken the Connecticut Board in April, 1977 and successfully passed such. At that time, there was a residency law in the state which prevented an applicant from receiving his license unless being a state resident. Upon questioning, it was revealed he had been licensed in Arizona and Minnesota, the later in which he had continually practiced for a period of seven years. He was questioned as to disciplinary action against him, and he denied any present or past complaints to his knowledge being in effect. He had maintained a continuing education course required by the State of Minnesota. After discussion, it was felt that the applicant should provide information from Arizona, as well as Minnesota as to his status. Upon his leaving the board, recommendation to the Department of Health was made that a license be issued, and felt that he had successfully passed the examination required by the State of Connecticut, as well as the National Boards, parts one and two, including physical therapy. The results of such have apparently been sent for and are on the way. Motion was made by Dr. Labbadia and seconded by Dr. Passero to recommend license to the Department of Health, passed unanimously.

Investigative Division of the Department of Health presented with quarterly report stating that eleven complaints were received between April 1, 1984 and June 30, 1984. Seven items had been closed by the Investigative Bureau. Dr. Labbadia and Dr. Passero voiced their objections feeling that the department with no power to dismiss a case but only investigate it, and that all arrangements made must be turned over to the Board of Examiners for their approval. Attorney Pavis was aware of our feeling, and later in the


meeting presented with the questionable files which had been closed. Upon review of the files, it appeared that Dr. Passero and myself were in agreement with their dispensation.

Questions were posed to the Attorney General's office and clarified and feel that the Board does have the power to impose a fine of \$1,000 per count. This was the attitude of the Board and after being investigated by the Attorney General's office, their opinion appears to be the same.

Discussion was made by Dr. Passero and Dr. Labbadia as to the use of titles of subspecialties by practitioners in advertising their professions. Although we feel and recognize post graduate education and its merits in any continuing education course, state statute does not qualify subspecialties. State Board does not test in any subspecialties and, therefore, it was felt that the licensure of chiropractic and the inclusions on the law should be listed as such. It was therefore the opinion of the board that no subspecialties be listed in the use of names and titles in any way. There is no legal backing for any subspecialties known to us and may be deceptive in nature to the public. The doctor of chiropractic is the highest degree in which we practice under and should limit itself to that. A recommendation will be made to the Department of Health in accordance with the Attorney General's opinion of rules and regulations not covered under statutes presently adopted by the Department of Health which will be drafted by Dr. Labbadia and reviewed by Dr. Passero then presented.

Discussion per Dr. Neal which has apparently been denied payment of Pap Smear with insurance company. The Department of Health stated it was not within the scope of practice of Chiropractic. Upon question it was decided that Pap Smears are used as a diagnostic procedure, and therefore would be in the scope of practice. The Department would read any correspondence and clarify Dr. Neal's complaint.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:20 p.m. with the next meeting scheduled for December 6, 1984.

Pursuant to state requirements of announcing meeting dates on a quarterly basis which were in January. Discussion was made at to next year's meetings. The dates have been set to be: January 13, 1985, 3:00 p.m. at UCONN Health Facility, Second Floor, Dental Wing; May 9, 1985 at 1:00 p.m. at the Department of Health Services; September 5, 1985 at 1:00 p.m. at the Department of Health Services; and December 5, 1985 at 1:00 p.m. at the Department of Health Services, 150 Washington St., Hartford, CT.

Also, the date of the June, 1985 examination was tentatively set for June 2, 1985.

Each applicant will be examined for a period of two hours, with 45 minutes dedicated to the PMP, and 40 minutes dedicated to the X-ray portion, and 30 minutes dedicated to the practical examination. There will be a need of 12 examiners for the PMP, 4 for the X-ray, and 6 for the practical portion. Arrangements will be made to have portable tables and other necessary articles be brought in by the examiners. A copy of the format of the test was presented and will be completed and sent to Dr. Kremer, as well as explanatory summary. It was felt that the applicants should be informed prior to the examination of the format in the pre-testing. The test will be completed by Dr. Labbadia and presented to Dr. Kremer within the next two weeks.

Newsletter was again discussed and we feel that the Board has approached a point in time which the newsletter can contain substantial information regarding the activities of the Board and any pertinent information. Dr. Labbadia has also agreed to prepare such with a commentary being prepared mutually by Dr. Passero and Dr. Labbadia. Expected publication is late January.

Discussion was made in regards to Dr. Rosenbluth's licensure. Some motion was made and licensure was recommended to the Department of Health Services. Questions have arisen in regards to his prior practice and after discussion by the Board, we found no evidence to change our original opinion of recommending licensure. A memo will be sent to Dr. Kremer in regards to this.



It was felt by Dr. Passero that past criteria must be used by the Department, and copies of such should be evaluated by us. It was found, as in the past, that determining business verses professional affairs is extremely difficult and that Dr. Passero requested copies of such criteria to be present. Dr. Labbadia recommended that case numbers be assigned and reported to the Board as to the date of the complaint and the number of the file. When a case is closed by the Department, the report of any closing would be numbered, enabling the Department to keep better track of what cases are still pending. Mr. Griffin agreed to investigate such and report back to the Board.

Dr. Dennis Day then addressed the Board with questions as to the examination procedure and question of partial credit given for examination scores. The system was explained to him. After that, review of candidate's examinations were made with the following results:



It was felt by both members that it was necessary that one hundred twenty (120) hours of practical experience with physical therapy be necessary in the college in which the applicant is graduated from in order to prepare him for such.

It was, therefore, the opinion of the Board that such should be implemented in the State of Connecticut requiring practical experience in the education process. Life College, although fully accredited, does not at present have such available.

Department also questioned my requisition for February meeting in Scottsdale, and they will look into receiving any request.



Meeting opened after both Dr. Passero and Dr. Labbadia had been subpoenaed in regards to the Weiss-Levinson case for deposition. The contents of the deposition was not be discussed to avoid possible future testimony problems.

Minutes of the May 15, 1986 meeting were reviewed and approved.

Next on agenda was discussion regarding Dr. Finlkestein who applied for relicensure, in that he forgot to renew his license. In review of such, there was evidence minor problems did exist in the State of New York which had been dealt with in the past, and he was never found guilty of any specific charges. Drs. Passero and Labbadia both had the opinion that there was no reason to refuse licensure to Dr. Finklestein.

Discussion was held in regard to recent Joseph Neal case in which a complete investigation was performed after the Department reviewed requests from Consumer Protection to clarify Scope of Practice and Pap Smears used by Chiropractors. A letter was reviewed dated July 3, 1986 signed by David Pavis of the Public Hearings Office. Agruments stating the Department had the right appeared to be erroneous and it is the opinion of Dr. Labbadia that they were ignorant of the law. The Chiropractic Board was in agreement that the Connecticut Medical Examining Board has no right to discuss or determinr scope of chiropractic issues, in that the Department should not have sought an opinion from the Medical Board in regards to such. Their conclusion stated that clinical lab work is not a part of the curriculum taught at chiropractic schools is totally erroneous in that it is a requirement of CCE accredited institutions. Only CCE accredited institutions can sit for Connecticut Boards. Mr. Pavis stated that the name of the respondent was not provided, therefore, they had the right to investigate, which, according to the interpretations of the Board, is contrary to the rules. In order to investigate an individual, a signed petition must be presented to the Department and only then, can they proceed with the investigation. The Board was not in disagreement with Mr. Pavis' statements and questions which he posed. In light of such, it was felt that the Department grossly over stepped the perimeters which they are bound by and in doing so, have violated the practitioners rights in the State of Connecticut. This matter will be taken up further with a letter drafted by Dr. Labbadia and sent to the State Attorney General's Office, with a copy going to the Board of Health.

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Dr. Labbadia stated that to date, he has not received reimbursement for travel expenses which were requested prior for this prior fiscal year for travel to Scottsdale, Arizona for Federation of Chiropractic Licensing Board meetings and National Board of Chiropractic Examiners. He will get in touch with Gary DeWitt.

It was also felt that the Board should expand to seven members, with four (4) D.C.'s, and three (3) lay members. The recent increased work load of the Board appears to be too much for Drs. Passero and Labbadia to handle on an ongoing basis. There has been a recent increase in the number of hearings and correspondence work and due to the nature of the position being voluntary and the maintenance of an active practice by both doctors, increases the burden. Also, the number of licensed chiropractors has greatly expanded, and in order to handle the work load, expansion of the Board as a non expenditure bill should be pursued.



Initial discussion was initiated by the Department of Health in that they wished to use the Written Clinical Competency Exam (WCCE) with a passing standard scale of 375. This would be provided by the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners and discussion in regards to this recommendation pursued. It was brought to attention by Dr. Lewis R. Labbadia that originally this recommendation was made by the Board of Chiropractic Examiners and not by the Department of Health. The Board will consider this examination to be explored for utilization in the future. However, it is a new exam and has only been given to people for one application. To date, we feel it is unreliable and found there is no basis to judge the effectiveness of the exam or content of the exam on one application.


Dr. Lewis R. Labbadia is one of the committee members writing this exam and feels it may be a problem with the application of the second exam compared to the first. It was therefore the opinion of the Board that this exam is not suitable at this time and there are other problems of logistics which must be attended to prior to accepting this exam (i.e. licensure by certification) if the exam would prevent approximately 40,000 chiropractors in the United States from getting licensed in the State and actually limit the number of people licensed as compared to expanded.

It was also noted that the Board approximately 12 months ago recommended to the Department of Health to form an AD HOC Committee to modify, improve, and re-write the present licensure examination. To date, there has been no action by the Department of Health in regards to this. This leaves the Department in a state in which no examination is prepared for the June scheduled exam. The Board has the feeling this was done on purpose in order to force the WCCE exam for our approval.

Other business before the Board was review of the last examination. There was no change in the scoring standard originally set or used on prior examinations. However, review of numerous examinations resulted in additional points being allowed for correct answers which are apparently incorrectly marked. The results of those were recorded by the Department of Health on their roster. Dr. Perlmuder has applied for relicensure in the State of Connecticut and stated at that time of taking the exam in 1976/1977 he passed the required examination however he decided to practice in New York and at that time there was a residency requirement in the State of Connecticut. It was the opinion of the Board that he had fulfilled his requirements for licensure and residency requirements are no longer in effect. Therefore, it was recommended to the Department of Health his license be reinstated.

There is a conflict in the dates for the next meeting and it has been moved from May 12, 1988 to May 19, 1988 at 10:00 a.m., at the Department of Health.

Attorney Lederer and Attorney Howard discussed what presentation to the public chiropractors could utilize and whether this was business practice or chiropractic practice. It is still considered to be a gray area in that there are occurrences in which such may occur and may be brought under the Department of Consumer Protection or Department of Health Services, or both. Some type of resolution to this predicament should be formulated, and the Board will seek some type of remedy with guidelines which most likely should be reviewed with the Department of Consumer Protection to determine utilization.

Request for declaratory ruling received by the Board regarding Dr. Jack Vitaz. After discussion with Paul Lahey from the Attorney General's Office it was determined that the Board will make a declaratory ruling. The Attorney General's office will notify Dr. Vitaz that the Board will make a declaratory ruling, but also request some additional information and more specification in his request he has already presented.


The Board recessed for lunch at 12:10 p.m. and reconvened at 1:20 p.m.

Joe Gillen and Janet Herman presented for discussion the logistics of the next examination for June 26, 1988 due to the fact that the examination content is not yet set. It is difficult to determine the exact logistics, but basically it was agreed to attempt the same procedure as last time.

Review of examinations per request of applicants was made with results of overall change to Pass on candidate #101. Candidate #60 changed due to correction error made to X-ray being passed, but overall patient did not qualify for licensure. Other examinations reviewed and found not to have a basis for change were #40, #74, #116, #14, #53, #54, #68, #70, #65, #113, #62, #95, #103, #59, #117.

First order of business made was previous minutes of meeting of May 19, 1988 accepted. At that time, the Board went into Executive Session from 10:15 to 10:45. Upon exiting Executive Session, the Board met with Dr. Gaulin-Kremer, Stanley Peck, and Joseph Gillen. They voiced concern to the Board about the quality of the examination being presented in the State of Connecticut. As the Board stated in the past, we are concerned about the quality of care the citizens of the State of Connecticut receive primarily, and the Departments agreed that it is their major challenge. It was agreed upon to form a committee to review the possibility of accepting the WCCE for utilization in the state. This committee would be formed by Board members, Association members, and non-Association members, Department representatives, as well as the possibility of Attorney General's office representatives.

Next, the Board met with Paul Lahey and Scott Holman from the State Attorney General's office. Questions as to Dr. Vitaz asking for a declaratory ruling on Acupuncture was again discussed. It was determined on both questions that more information is necessary from Dr. Vitaz or his representative to determine if a declaratory ruling is necessary. This will be sent for and further discussion will occur at a later date.

Gary Griffin from the Investigations Department presented to fill the Board in on any questions. There were no questions from the Board regarding Investigations or Procedures and Processing.

Next, the Board met with Janet Herman to discuss questions on review of examinations taken in June. Candidates number 85, 4, 72, 57, 66, 58, 83, and 32, were reviewed. The examinations reviewed consisted of re-adding figures, as well as reviewing long-hand questions on X-ray examination. The results of those reviews show no changes were warranted in Candidates 57, 58, 83, and 32.

The others revealed error in correcting of examinations, and changes were made in their scores.

It was emphasized to Celia Carroll that due to the complexities of the previous meetings, an agenda should be presented prior to the next meeting. It was agreed that attempts would be made to fulfill this need by the Board.

Dr. Labbadia read into the record the letters prepared on March 25, 1988, and June 15, 1988. The letters pertained to the Board's response to the Methodology and refusal of the Department to use the new examination prepared by the Board. It was felt by the Board that these should be read into the record and recorded into the minutes of the meeting as to reflect the attitude of the Board and history of events which occur with the Department and the Board regarding the examination procedures. It was determined they should be placed in the minutes as a reflection of history of occurrences rather than to direct it to any individual.

The content of the letters were as follows:

March 25, 1988

In response to the Department's recommendations pertaining to the Written Clinical Competency Examination, (WCCE), we acknowledge that the passing standards in the licensing examination are prescribed by the Department of Health Services with a consent of the Board.

However, we are in disagreement that this WCCE has any documentation for reliability and that the content is valid. The examination has been given one time and has not proven itself with the standard test of time. The Connecticut State Board of Chiropractic Examiners approximately one year ago had recommend consideration of this examination, and still to this date feels that it is an examination that should be considered. However, to require such an examination at this point in time would be wrong as well as derelict and that it poses a number of problems. Licensing in the state would be limited only to those who have taken this examination. People licensed in other states prior to this examination will be required to take this examination in order to get licensing. This restricts a body of approximately 40,000 from ever practicing in the State of Connecticut unless they were to return to take this examination. Prior to giving the seal of approval by the State Board, it is our opinion that the examination must show that it does show clinical competency and that the examination is fair to all the individuals taking it.

We do not feel that the content of the examination can be based on one application and that the second examination is totally different than the first examination.

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The scoring standard of the National Board is not being clearly defined, as per request of Dr. Lewis Labbadia on numerous occasions. The Board also will reserve the right to examine applicants even when this examination is accepted in the area of X-ray and hands-on practical. The examination has no hands-on practical or practical X-ray diagnosis in which the applicants are required to read a film and, therefore, they cannot quantitatively or qualitatively evaluate the applicants ability to perform such. It is in the best interest of the public that people can read X-rays and show a proficiency in doing so as well as treating individuals.

In light of such, the Board takes the position at this time that the examination should remain as it has in the past. The Board has recommended to the Department of Health Services to arrange for a committee over 12 months ago to re-evaluate the examination and rewrite the examination; being given. However, to date and to the best of our knowledge, this has not been done.

June 15, 1988

Dr. Labbadia received a phone call on June 14, 1988 from Joseph Gillen, the Section Chief of Applications and Examinations. He related that he had sat down with both Mr. Peck and Dr. Kremer and reviewed the examination prepared for the upcoming licensing examination date of June 26, 1988. He expressed to Dr. Labbadia that both of you felt that the contents of the exam were not pertinent to patient Management problems, and that the question format and contents were all National Board test questions which had already been covered in the National Boards. He, therefore, stated that the Department did not want to utilize the examination prepared.

First of all, on what basis can a lawyer and two Ph.D's in Education evaluate the content of a professional examination? We find it self-serving and ridiculous to think that you feel that you can evaluate the contents of a question for its pertinence to professional practice when you have no formal knowledge of what goes on in and what conditions are seen in a Chiropractic office. Fifteen to sixteen of the questions are based on patient history, and the other questions presented pertain to clinical situations when presenting to an office, must be evaluated and understood in order for the patients to receive competent health care. A lack of knowledge of the specific areas addressed in the questions has the potential to pose severe debilitating results from a physician not knowing the answers to such.

Recently, the department presented the members of the Board a letter stating that they intended to utilize the Written Clinical Competency Examination (WCCE) by the National Board for a basis of licensing. They stated that its content had been justified already. The Board disagreed with such, and that the examination had been given for only one application and has not been time-tested or proven in any fashion, however, Dr. Labbadia was one of 12 committee members who formulated and wrote the first two WCCE examinations. He personally evaluated, prepared, and edited every question on the first two WCCE examinations. However, when doing the same thing within the State of Connecticut utilizing questions which were not prepared by himself but reviewed and evaluated as well as documented as to correctness of the answers, the department says that this does not evaluate in a patient management protocol! Dr. Kremer has stated in the past that multiple choice questions vs. patient management cognitive thinking formats are equal in their ability to evaluate a person's knowledge. However, there seems to be reason to criticize this format on this examination apparently because it was prepared within the state, but this format is totally acceptable if it was prepared by the National Board. The other statement which was apparently made regarding this proposed examination was that an applicant would only need a library card in order to get the books with the answers. Correct us if we are wrong, but a library card opens up vast volumes of knowledge which is accessible to the general public and will allow a person wishing to review all the medical texts available and to read the content of those texts, then, yes, he can pass the examination. Does this mean we should take the library cards from all applicants so that we prohibit them from obtaining knowledge in a library? Perhaps this sounds absurd, but it is the same reaction we had after receiving the call from Joseph Gillen.

We had asked Mr. Gillen to place in writing the reason he gave us for not utilizing this examination, and that it appeared contradictory to the attitude of the Department of Health Services in that the examination proposed is not acceptable because of the contents being in their judgement is not patient management, but at the same time they attempted to insist on and recommend the WCCE examination, which in our opinion, contains less clinically significant questions per percentage than this examination. How can one endorse one examination of relatively the same format and supposedly same content as being the examination that the department chose, but on the other hand reject a similar examination on the basis as was stated above.

One and one-half years ago, which to date has not been acted upon, the Board recommended that the Department formulate an AD HOC

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
Committee to further develop the patient management format which has been utilized in the state for the past five years. We have been willing and anxious to work along side of you in helping to develop bonified patient management type problems and to modify questions as to remove any subjectivity. The lack of action in doing such only supports the Board's attitude and position that the Department is not concerned with formulation a defensible examination, but is more concerned in reducing costs of administration and responsibility of the employees of the State of Connecticut Department of Health Services as to make their job easier. The motivation and objective behind the Board of Chiropractic Examiners is to insure that incompetent practitioners are not being licensed.

Practitioners which are licensed in the state must be minimally competent as to not represent a public health problem. The examination is to designed to take the "cream of the crop" but instead to the applicants being licensed do not represent a potential for public hazard. We are of the opinion that the WCCE exam does not do such and, therefore, cannot accept it at this date because we do not feel it does meet our objectives. Also, under the departments proposed requirement for the WCCE exam for licensing, in the state of Connecticut, this would prohibit some 40,000 Chiropractors from ever practicing in the state which is opposite of the Board's attitude. We do not want to prohibit licensing. The acceptance and requirement of the WCCE exam would do just that.

In conclusion, we still cannot comprehend how three non-professionals can evaluate the contents of an examination as to its pertinence in practice. Also, that when it was recommended and fought for, the WCCE exam was justifiable, but in the same breath the department states that the same format is unacceptable and reject it on the grounds that it does not evaluate a patient management format! The departments reasoning is obviously self-serving in an effort to eliminate work from their schedule and decrease cost factors on its budget and has nothing to do with the job of protecting public health safety.

The meeting adjourned at 1:15 with the next meeting scheduled for 10:00 am on December 1, 1988.

A motion was made to accept the previous minutes. Motion by Dr. Labbadia and seconded by Dr. Peyser. Motion passed unanimously. It was the feeling of the Board that there was a policy set down in regards to exam reviews and that it was not being adhered to. The Department stated that they had never seen this policy. Dr. Labbadia pointed out that in the minutes of the August 11, 1983 meeting, the guides were set and this is what the Department and the Board had utilized in the past. A motion was made by Mary Coman that the policy of the past be amended to allow a 30 day time limit to request a review of an examination and that the reason the review was being made be clearly stated, and the area of concern be outlined and specifics of the reason be clearly defined. If a review was going to be granted, then the review would be limited to the areas of stated concern or conflict. Motion seconded by Dr. Stern and passed unanimously.

It was determined that no notice to the applicants of this procedure is necessary unless they request it specifically.

The Sherman College of Straight Chiropractic has applied to the Department of Health Services to be included in the list of approved schools. After short discussion the matter was tabled until the next meeting.

Exam logistics were discussed and the Department stated that there were a total of 107 candidates, 66 full exams first time full exams, 22 X-ray only, 7 PMP only, 1 Practical and 11 complete retakes.

A tentative date set for February 4, 1989 pending approval securing an exam site. The exam was determined and set for its content and format. This is the last time for this exam format and that after this exam, the WCCE would be required to apply to sit for the practical examination. It was again emphasized that the Department, with the aid of the Board, would have to develop a new practical exam.

Review of application for reinstatement by Dr. Mark Goldenberg. After hearing and considering the facts presented, it was recommended by the Board that this not be granted. Motion by Dr. Labbadia, seconded by Mary Coman. The motion carried unanimously.

Reviews of exams #107, 16 and 17 were made with the results of those reviews indicating that there was reason due to scoring errors that a change was in order for applicant #17. There was no basis found to change #107 or 16.


In response to the recommendations of the AD HOC Committee on utilizing the WCCE exam in the State of Connecticut, a motion was made by Dr. Labbadia that: The Board of Chiropractic Examiners require the Written Clinical Competency Examination (WCCE) of the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners, in addition to the practical examination defined and required in the state statutes, requiring the candidate for licensure to demonstrate principals and procedures, including orthopedics, neurology, diagnosis, X-ray, vertebral palpation, and adjustment.

At this point, the discussion of the case regarding Dr. Jesse Jutkowitz was scheduled, and Dr. Labbadia having recused himself from this case requested that any other matters before the Board be presented first. One matter was brought forth regarding a request from Prudential Insurance as to the scope of practice in the state allowing heavy metal screening, urinary indican, urinalysis, leucocyte magnesium, and carbide laboratory testing. The Board reviewed the question and determined it was within the scope of practice defined under the law.

Dr. Labbadia then excused himself at 12:10, leaving the remaining board members to discuss the Jutkowitz case in executive session.

Meeting adjourned at 2:55 p.m.

Board of Veterinary Medicine Case/Angelo Della Ripa, D.C. - The Board ruled to accept Consent Order 910904-07-015.

- A) After reviewing the case it was decided that the doctor must identify himself as a chiropractor in advertisements. He is to use D.C. whenever he uses the prefix "Dr."
- B) The doctor is practicing out of his scope of practice, however it appears that he is trying to get guidance from the Veterinary Board as to when someone other than a veterinarian can perform vet/chiropractic under the guidance of a veterinarian.

It was agreed upon by the new board members that complaints will continue to be reviewed by professional board members on a "Doctor-of-the month" basis.

Chiropractic Neurology-

- A) A discussion was held regarding the differences between the American College of Chiropractic Neurology and the American Chiropractic Academy of Neurology. These organizations are working together for the goal of merging within 5 years.
- B) As with medical doctors, chiropractors are allowed to have sub-specialties. However D.C.'s must first identify themselves as chiropractors so as not to confuse the public.

- C) Subspecialties are not licensed by the State. Certificates of education are given.
- D) Three Levels of Education for Subspecialties
 - 1. Board Eligible - Taken required hours; exam not passed
 - 2. Residency; higher level of exam
 - 3. Diplomate- passed exam; completed entire program

Connecticut does not have a law disallowing the use of Diplomate in advertising. Debra Tomassone will inquire with other states regarding regulation of Chiropractic neurology in advertising. She will also contact the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners for their position on the use of the terminology "Diplomate".

Several questions arose regarding the subspecialties in chiropractic:

- a. Is the neurology program similar for D.C.'s and M.D.s?
- b. Can a D.C. perform the same tests as an M.D.? (Yes, as long as it is within our scope of practice.)
- c. How to address this to the public?

The Board ruled that it is not fraudulent to use the terminology "Chiropractic Neurology". With any and all subspecialties in Chiropractic, the doctor must first identify himself as a Chiropractor.

The Board ruled that in reviewing complaints regarding chiropractic neurology, experts must be brought in.

Proposal of Joint Board Meetings- The Psychology Board Chairman would like to start a Board consisting of Chairmans of various Boards to discuss mutual matters of concern. The Chiropractic Board agreed to participate.






Paul Powers Deliberation







IV. EXAM RESULTS BY SCHOOL - Dr. Gillen presented a breakdown of the latest exam results by school, but cautioned that no inferences should be made or conclusions drawn as the group was small. Records will continue to be kept in this manner for future exams.

V. ADDITIONAL AGENDA ITEMS

- A. NATIONAL FEDERATION OF CHIROPRACTIC EXAMINERS CONFERENCE - Dr. Grimmeisen reported that he attended the NFCE conference held in Portland, Oregon. Among the topics discussed were reciprocity, the growing trend toward group practices as opposed to solo practices, the problem of sexual misconduct among practitioners, and the development of a special purpose exam (SPEC) for practitioners with years of experience. In other professions, a SPEC exam can be used for checking competency for relicensure after absence from practice or for licensure by endorsement.
- B. CONTINUING EDUCATION BILL - Dr. Grimmeisen reported that a committee has been formed to draft regulations for CCE, and the Board will have input into this process. Preliminary discussions have occurred regarding mandatory CCE and license renewals.

Stanley Peck, Director of Medical Quality Assurance, reported that the committee will meet in September to decide what needs to be included. Attorney Peck elaborated on the process involved in drafting regulations. A Notice of Intent to adopt regulations must also be published.

- C. PAUL CARPENTER, D.C. - Presentation of Consent Order by Staff Attorney Dan Shapiro.

Assistant Attorney General Jane Comerford advised the Board that the terms of Paragraphs B and C impose conditions that can only be required under probationary status, however, the agreement specifically states that the order "does not place on probation". The Board requested more specific details regarding the status of the order and Dr. Stern's reviews.

Dr. Oemcke made a motion, seconded by Dr. Clukey, to reject the Consent Order. The motion passed unanimously. Counsel will have thirty days to renegotiate.

- D. IMPAIRED PRACTITIONER PROGRAM - Dr. Grimmeisen would like to see an impaired practitioner program for chiropractors, similar to that of physicians, in place before problems arise.



FCLB 63rd ANNUAL CONGRESS - Dr. Grimmeisen volunteered to attend the annual meeting being held April 17-21, 1996. He requested Dr. Porzio to stand as his alternate. Dr. Grimmeisen will petition the state chiropractic associations to assist with costs.

MICHAEL SWILLER, D.C. - The Board reviewed the Memorandum of Decision for Petition #881207-07-008 as it pertains to pending licensure suspension of Dr. Swiller and the recusal of Dr. Grimmeisen. A settlement offer was presented to the Board by Assistant Attorney General Henry Salton. The Board entered Executive Session at 11:00 a.m. to discuss pending litigation on this matter. The public meeting resumed at 11:30 a.m.

A discussion ensued during which Brendan Canty felt the state did not prove its prima facie case and therefore the charges against Dr. Sampino should be dismissed. Kenneth Sheptoff agreed. Doctors Clukey, Porzio, and Cianciolo felt that they would look beyond the single witness and look at the overall text of the case and concluded that there should be a hearing. A vote was taken on the aforementioned motion and resulted in the following: Doctors Cianciolo, Clukey and Porzio voted in favor while Brendan Canty and Kenneth Sheptoff were opposed. The hearing for Dr. Sampino will be scheduled to resume immediately following the next meeting of the Board.

IV. EXECUTIVE SESSION

On a motion made by Mr. Canty and seconded by Dr. Porzio, the Board went into Executive Session from 10:40 AM to 10:55 AM.

V. VINCENT BUONANNO, DC, PETITION NO. 910326-007-003 - CONSIDERATION OF MEMORANDUM OF DECISION ON REMAND

A motion was made by Brendan Canty and seconded by Kenneth Sheptoff to accept the Memorandum of Decision as written. Following discussion a vote was taken on the motion to accept the Memorandum of Decision on Remand. The motion passed with Dr. Villani, Mr. Canty and Mr. Sheptoff in favor; Dr. Cianciolo and Dr. Clukey were opposed. Dr. Porzio abstained. The Memorandum of Decision was signed by Chairman Villani.

The Board would like to have input and involvement in the reporting process. Also discussed was the fact that the state said records are kept indefinitely, and that updates and changes are made to an existing file. There was a request made by Kenneth Sheptoff to see a printout of a case which has been reported. Dr. Villani will provide him with a printout. Dr. Porzio discussed the possibility of removing disciplinary violations from a Respondent's permanent record. Attorney Peck stated that there is no authority to do this at this time. Dr. Villani suggested the Board develop a document that would help the Department of Public Health on how to categorize violations for reporting. Attorney Peck felt that this would be especially useful in low level violations. He did feel that other violations, the most common occurring ones, are clear cut.

VII. REQUEST FOR DECLARATORY RULING REGARDING DISPENSING HOMEOPATHIC REMEDIES

The Board discussed with Assistant Attorney General Paul Lahey state statutes which state we cannot use substances found in materia medica. Attorney Lahey also stated that he would check on the legislative history and its intention, and will also check on any existing precedence regarding the administration of homeopathic remedies.

VIII. REQUEST FOR DECLARATORY RULING OF TOPICAL APPLICATION OF PROGESTERONE

The Board discussed with Assistant Attorney General Paul Lahey the request for a declaratory ruling of topical application of progesterone. The Board felt that additional information will be required.

Limitation of examinations by Landmark is not in the Board's authority, it is a contract issue. The performing of breast, genital and rectal exams is within the scope of chiropractic practice. Even though a Doctor of Chiropractic is not prohibited from doing these exams, Landmark will not reimburse for the procedures. On the advice of Assistant Attorney General Henry Salton, the Board will not render an opinion as to the appropriateness of Landmark Health Care contracts with Chiropractic Physicians. Dr. Villani will draft language to describe a chiropractor's responsibility even though a reimbursement does not cover a procedure. Brendan Canty recommended, seconded by Dr. Clukey, that a letter be sent to

Dr. Vallone indicating that this is a contract issue. The motion passed unanimously. Attorney Salton will draft the letter on behalf of the Board.

V. **CORRESPONDENCE FROM CHIROPRACTOR IN FLORIDA**

Dr. Villani received a letter from a Florida Chiropractor who stated he was denied a waiver for Connecticut licensure. Dr. Villani questioned why the doctor's request for a waiver was never brought to the attention of the Board. Stephen Carragher reported the said doctor in question never made application for licensure, he only requested information on reciprocity.

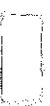
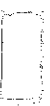
Dr. Clukey would also like to discuss with the Department of Public Health the possibility using the Department's resources to send mailings to chiropractors licensed in Connecticut.

I. **MINUTES**

Draft minutes of the March 11, 1999 meeting were reviewed. Dr. Villani made a motion, seconded by Dr. Porzio, to approve the minutes as written. The motion passed unanimously.

II. **CORRESPONDENCE**

The Board reviewed correspondence from Dr. Villani dated June 3, 1999 to Richard Duenas and Sharon Vallone. It was the unanimous decision of the Board to approve this correspondence.

III. **REORGANIZATION - DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC HEALTH**

Debra Tomassone reported to the Board on the recent reorganization of Department of Public Health Staff.

III A. **LICENSURE WITHOUT WRITTEN EXAMINATION**

Debra Tomassone indicated that the Board will be informed when licenses are issued without an examination. Steven Purman, licensed by the State of Florida, wanted his license in Connecticut to be based on his Florida credentials. This request was denied because the law required that all must take the practical exam. Also, there appears to be a problems with Part 3 of the National Boards. The Board discussed what the test needs to be like in order for it to qualify for the State of Connecticut versus another test. In this conversation, the term "substantially similar" was discussed and that it would need to be defined by the Office of the Attorney General. It is stated that "substantially similar" does not necessarily mean exact.

The need for a comparability study was also discussed. This will be brought to the attention of Assistant Attorney General Richard J. Lynch. There are several difficulties in studying these tests from state to state which are as follows: 1) the security of each state's tests, 2) to determine a way to measure the degree of difficulty, and 3) pass points. Further discussion of these factors will be forthcoming at the next meeting.

Debra Tomassone indicated that a psychometric evaluation costs approximately \$100,000.00.

III B. UTILIZATION OF DEPARTMENT RESOURCES

The Board asked whether Department of Public Health resources can be utilized for the Board to communicate with Connecticut licensed Chiropractic Physicians. Donna Brewer reported there exists an Office of Health Communications to which this issue can be raised.

III C. USE OF CONSULTANTS

A discussion ensued with Kay Zarrella regarding the use of Board Members as consultants, or can an outside panel be used to review cases so that Board Members are not recused from hearings. It seems that this would not be a problem since they are volunteers. Other Boards have used outside consultants which they usually pick from different geographical areas. Instructions to the consultants would need to be reviewed. The Board would like to review the last two cases reviewed by Dr. Porzio as a method of fine-tuning the review process. Copies of all documents relative to the cases should be made available to the Board.

IV. REINSTATEMENT CONSENT ORDER - FRANCIS SARTIANO, DC

The Board has requested information from the Licensing Board regarding Dr. Sartiano's current status of both his practice and continuing education credits that he may have received since 1994. The Board would also like to know what his current licensure status is and how this related to him being convicted of a felon, as well as any other prior complaints, personally and/or against his license. This item is tabled to the next meeting.

V. MEMORANDUM OF DECISION - ROGER SYLVESTRE, DC




X. CHIROPRACTOR CONSULTANTS

I. MINUTES

Draft minutes of the September 23, 1999 meeting were reviewed. Mr. Sheptoff made a motion, seconded by Dr. Porzio, to approve the minutes as written. The motion passed unanimously.

II. NATIONAL BOARDS PART IV EXAMINATION

Vincent Greco, DC and Paul Townsend, DC from the National Board of Chiropractic Examiners were present to give a presentation regarding the National Board Part IV Examination. The examination is given twice a year at 17 testing sites throughout the country. The closest sites to Connecticut are in New York State. 41 States currently use the Part IV examination as part of the licensing process. The examination is a standardized practical examination which tests diagnostics, radiology, assessment, history taking, and chiropractic technique. There is a 13%-20% failure rate. Failure requires retaking of the entire examination. The current cost per candidate is \$850.00. The National Board of Chiropractic Examiners will fully defend the exam if there are any challenges. The Board will have further discuss concerning use of this examination at future Board meetings.

III. FACT FINDING REVIEW - SANTO SAMPINO, DC, NO. 940809-07-009

Assistant Attorney General Patricia Gerner was present to provide counsel to the Board. The fact finding from the September 23, 1999 meeting was reviewed. The Board made a determination regarding conclusions and an Order which will be drafted for the Board's signature at a subsequent meeting.

IV. REQUEST FOR RESOLUTION

The Board reviewed a request from the Connecticut Chiropractic Association that Board adopt a resolution that Medicare reimbursement not be allowed to non-chiropractors for the service of manipulations for the treatment of spinal subluxations. Assistant Attorney General Henry Salton provided counsel to the Board. Mr. Sheptoff made a motion, seconded by Dr. Clukey, that the Board adopt the following resolution which expresses the Board's view but should not be considered as governing principle:

"Whereas, applicants seeking licensure to practice chiropractic must demonstrate significant education, training and experience in the treatment of neuro-musculo-skeletal disorders (including subluxations of the spine) and other physical conditions related thereto, as well as, the ability to perform a sophisticated differential diagnosis to determine the overall health status of the patient to determine when referral to another health care provider is necessary in order to assure patient safety, and

"Whereas, this board is aware of no other health care provider licensed by this state with the specific education, training and experience to perform the chiropractic service of manual manipulation of the spine to correct a subluxation, and believes that patient health and welfare may well be severely compromised by allowing non-chiropractors, with inadequate or no training, to perform chiropractic services, and

"Whereas, the federal government through the Health Care Financing Administration (HCFA) has proposed a 'choice of provider' regulation related to the Medicare+Choice program (Medicare Part C) that would encourage non-chiropractors to provide the statutorily defined chiropractic service consisting of 'manual manipulation of the spine to correct a subluxation,' and

"Whereas, such 'choice of provider' regulation usurps the authority of this Board to regulate the practice of chiropractic and to grant licenses to applicants to practice chiropractic in this state, be it therefore

"Resolved, that the Connecticut Board of Chiropractic Examiners formally opposes the implementation of the 'choice of practitioner' provision of the proposed Medicare+Choice regulations as that provision may encourage persons not licensed to perform chiropractic services to perform manual manipulation of the spine to correct a subluxation and thereby practice chiropractic within the jurisdiction of this Board, to the ultimate detriment of the health and safety of the public.

"Be it further resolved that this Board views the intrusion of the 'choice of practitioner' provision of the proposed Medicare+Choice regulations to violate the right and authority of the state to oppose and to rectify the current proposal of the Health Care Financing Administration to assure that this state retains the right to regulate and license the professional practice of chiropractic within its borders and to protect the health and safety of its citizens."

V. DECLARATORY RULING

Assistant Attorney General Henry Salton was present to provide counsel to the Board. The Board scheduled a Declaratory Ruling hearing for March 16, 2000 regarding the following issues:

1. Whether the review and evaluation of chiropractic services provided to a patient for the purpose of determining clinical necessity and appropriateness of chiropractic care constitute the practice of chiropractic as defined in the Connecticut General Statutes?
2. Whether the examination of a patient for the purposes of determining clinical necessity and appropriateness of chiropractic care provided to said patient constitute the practice of chiropractic as defined in the Connecticut General Statutes?

VI. MICHAEL SWILLER, DC - REQUEST FOR REINSTATEMENT

Assistant Attorney General Henry Salton was present to provide counsel to the Board. Dr. Porzio made a motion seconded by Mr. Sheptoff to deny Dr. Swiller's request for reinstatement of his license which was revoked on July 24, 1997


