CONNECTICUT'S BIG FIX

By Frank L. Ribaudo, Director, Animal Population Control Program Later this month, certain Connecticut pet owners will experience an event that has never happened before in this state. The Connecticut Veterinary Medical Association (CVMA) will host the CT Big Fix, a statewide vaccination/sterilization extravaganza that plans to provide benefits to more than 500 companion pets owned by low-income Connecticut residents. The Connecticut Department of Agriculture's Animal Population Control Program (APCP) has been providing assistance to the Big Fix committee, made up of Connecticut veterinarians and volunteers.

The original concept came from Town & Country Veterinary Associates owner Dr. Gayle Block, veterinarian and current CVMA president. Dr. Block, who is also a member of the APCP advisory board, learned last year that state statute allows the APCP low-income program to be funded by up to 10% of the APCP's total annual income. Approximately 1,000 vouchers are set aside annually for pets owned by CT low-income residents. While these vouchers are usually gone in six months, the need for assistance does not go away.

"Though I take some credit for facilitating the Big Fix, I could not have reached this point without the help of my committee, Department of Agriculture APCP staff, and, most importantly, the donated time and hospital space from over 50 veterinary practices statewide and supplies from a number of pharmaceutical companies," said Dr. Block.

The CVMA dates back more than 125 years. According to its membership directory:

The CVMA was founded in 1884 with the intent of bettering the profession and the foresight of better days to come. Annual dues in the beginning were six (\$6.00) dollars. In the early days the profession really had no power, no more than quarantine and even in such cases the law was not enforced. A legislative committee was formed to determine who the proper authorities were and who did have the power to quarantine and take the matter in hand. The early CVMA's persistence in bringing forth the dangers of diseases no

doubt had a great bearing on laws which were later passed putting the control of diseases dangerous to public health in the hands of proper authorities who could act officially. In 1905, a Veterinary Practice Act was passed pertaining to the practice of veterinary medicine, surgery and dentistry, which created an examining board and required all those who wished to practice in this state to have passed a satisfactory examination prescribed by the board. This was considered to be a most outstanding accomplishment. The CVMA is known to be one of the most active in matters pertaining to Veterinary Science and Public Health, legislative matters relating to the Veterinary profession and ranks among the highest in percentage membership.



The CT Big Fix will be held February 20-24, 2012 and is only for pets from Connecticut low-income residents. The cost for this program is \$20.12. To qualify, residents will have to provide a current Department of Social Services (DSS) identification card or be on a rental-assistance or Section 8 program. Registration will be on a first-come, first-served basis, and the program will allow up to two pets per household. This program is not for people who have the means to provide for the care and wellbeing of their pets.







CONNECTICUT 4-H SHEEP PROJECT CLINIC FEB 25


