CELEBRATING NATIONAL FARMERS' MARKET WEEK IN CONNECTICUT

HARTFORD - Agriculture Commissioner Steven K. Reviczky marked National Farmers' Market Week on Tuesday by visiting Connecticut's first-ever market, established at the historic Old State House nearly four centuries ago.

As customers from surrounding office buildings and neighborhoods browsed growers and vendors set up on the building's brick plaza, Reviczky noted that the site was once home to the "Great Country Store," created in 1643 by the General Court of Connecticut as a public market for produce, cattle and other merchandise.

"What better place to celebrate National Farmers"

Market Week in Connecticut than where it all started," Reviczky said.

Today, there are more than 125 certified farmers' markets all over the state.

"Customers looking for fresh Connecticut Grown produce and other items can probably find a farmers' market near their home or work virtually every day of the week," Reviczky said. "These markets are a great example of how agriculture is thriving in Connecticut and right now is the perfect time to take advantage of the incredible

quality and diversity of products they offer."

Connecticut has led New England in the growth of new farms in recent years, and agriculture contributes about \$3.5 billion into Connecticut's economy and represents about 28,000 jobs.

Visiting a market in Hartford was also significant because of the great increase in the number of farmers' markets in cities, where fresh produce hasn't always been readily available.

"This farmers' market is really special," said Nicole Sousa, an educator at the Old State House who helps run the market. "It brings the community together and brings local produce to people who not

> only want it but who need it, especially here in downtown Hartford."

In his proclamation declaring Aug. 6-12 as National Farmers Market Week, U.S. Secretary of Agriculture Sonny Perdue said the 18th annual celebration supports producers by encouraging customers to buy at their local farmers' market.

Farmers' markets and other agricultural direct-marketing outlets contribute approximately \$9 billion each year to the U.S. economy, he said, and "serve as significant outlets by which small-to-medium, new
