LOW-INCOME/FERAL CAT PROGRAMS RETURN

The Department of Agriculture is pleased to announce that for FY 2011, the Animal Population Control Program (APCP) will release vouchers to low-income Connecticut residents to help vaccinate and sterilize their owned pets and to not-for-profit organizations for the purpose of providing similar benefits for feral cats. These two programs were not offered in FY 2010 due to the state budget crisis.



Both programs were activated on July 1, 2010 and the response is expected to be brisk. "In today's tight economy we are pleased to be able to offer on a limited basis, benefits to those who need it the most", said Department of Agriculture Commissioner F. Philip Prelli. Effective October 2007. Public Act 07-105 became law, which allows the Department to set aside up to 10% of APCP income for the vaccination and sterilization of feral cats and another 10%

for pets owned by low-income Connecticut residents. Approximately \$75,000 is expected to be set aside for each program.

Low-income CT residents must apply to the APCP and qualify through one of seven different Department of Social Services (DSS) programs. Once eligibility has been determined, up to two vouchers per household will be sent to the approved recipient. State vouchers provide for two vaccinations and either a dog or cat sterilization benefit. The pet must be altered in order to receive vaccinations. Feral cat benefits are offered to CT non-profit organizations for the purpose of vaccinating and sterilizing feral cats. Organizations must submit a grant application by the deadline date of July 31, 2010. Once received, applications are reviewed by a grant committee and awarded by the end of August. The benefit period will run from September 1, 2010 to March 31, 2011.

For FY 2009, 676 feral cat vouchers were issued to twelve non-profit organizations and 654 used for a 97% compliance rate. Low-income vouchers were issued to 555 pets and 284 used for a 51% sterilization rate. The ability to offer benefits for these two programs is due to the success of the Animal Population Control Program. Since 1995, the program has provided benefits to more than 70,000 companion pets, which has led to a 50% reduction in both the impound and euthanasia rate at municipal facilities across the state.

NEW ISSUE OF HEALTHY ANIMALS NOW ONLINE

The Agricultural Research Service (ARS) has posted a new issue of Healthy Animals. This quarterly online newsletter compiles ARS news and expert resources on the health and well-being of agricultural livestock, poultry and fish.

The new issue is available online at: http://www.ars.usda.gov/is/np/ha/han42.htm.

Each quarter, one article in Healthy Animals focuses on a particular element of ARS animal research. The current issue discusses ARS research on ways to help cattle producers protect their animals against heat stress.

Research highlighted in this issue:

- ARS findings that coat color, wind speed, access to shade and breed could influence the animal's physical response to heat.
- A model that predicts when environmental conditions are ripe for heat stress in livestock, and presents the information in an easy-to-read, color-coded map.
- Findings that solar-radiation-blocking polyethylene cloths are an effective way to reduce stress-related losses.

Professionals interested in animal health issues might want to bookmark the site as a resource for locating animal health experts. An index lists ARS research locations covering 70 animal health topics. These range from specific diseases, such as Lyme disease to broad subjects such as nutrition or parasites.

The site also provides complete contact information for the 25 ARS research groups that conduct studies aimed at protecting and improving farm animal health.

CT AGRICULTURAL EXPERIMENT STATION ASSISTS U. S. FOOD AND DRUG ADMINISTRATION ON TESTING SEAFOOD FROM THE GULF OF MEXICO

The Connecticut Agricultural Experiment Station (CAES) participates in a federal food safety program, Food Emergency Response Network, under the guidance of the US Food and Drug Administration (FDA). In a national response to check the safety of oysters, shrimp, crabs, and fin fish in the oilspill area of the Gulf of Mexico, new alternative methods were developed to more efficiently analyze seafood samples for polycyclic aromatic hydrocarbons, chemicals associated with petroleum. CAES chemists worked closely with scientists in the US FDA Forensic Chemistry Center in Cincinnati and with chemists in the Minnesota Department of Agriculture to develop the

On Wednesday, July 28, 2010, the first shipment of seafood samples arrived at the CAES for analysis. The testing will be conducted in at least two other laboratories nationwide and is expected to continue for several months. By agreement, the results must be reported to the US FDA regulatory officials for review. "We are pleased that we can assist in this national crisis" said Dr. Louis A. Magnarelli, Director of the CAES, "We have the expertise and state-of-the-art instruments that can measure unwanted chemicals to parts per billion to ensure food and product safety." The CAES, founded in 1875, is the oldest state agricultural experiment station in the US and is a separate state agency.
