



Crime In Connecticut Drops To Lowest Levels In Four Decades



HARTFORD — With significant advances in DNA testing and more surveillance cameras than ever, crime in Connecticut has dropped to its lowest levels in more than 40 years.


Gov. Dannel P. Malloy hailed the drop Monday during a news conference at the Capitol, with 12 police chiefs and law enforcement officers standing behind him.

The state's major crimes dropped by 8.6 percent in 2013 when compared to 2012, according to the state's annual crime report, released Monday. That covers the eight major crimes that are reported to the **FBI** — murder, rape, robbery, aggravated assault, burglary, larceny, automobile theft and arson.....




Gun homicides in CT, 2004 - 2014



Gun homicides & race/ethnicity in CT, 2004 - 2014





CT juvenile arrests, by age, 2008 through 2013




Nationwide juvenile arrests

Connecticut and the US



Incarceration by age, CT, 2009 through 2014




Connecticut General Statutes Sec. 51-277c

Investigation and prosecution of crimes involving physical violence and possession of firearm. In the investigation and prosecution of crime, priority shall be given to crimes involving physical violence and to crimes involving the possession of a firearm.

(P.A. 97-257, S. 1, 13.)
