MERRILL: POLLS ARE OPEN ACROSS CONNECTICUT FOR AT LEAST 23 STATE AND FEDERAL PRIMARIES, GO AND VOTE!

SECRETARY OF THE STATE REPORTS MORE THAN 1.1 MILLION REGISTERED DEMOCRATS AND REPUBLICANS ELIGIBLE TO CAST BALLOTS TODAY

HARTFORD: Secretary of the State Denise Merrill today reminded registered Democrats and Republicans in Connecticut that as of 6:00 a.m. polls are now open for statewide primaries. Secretary Merrill is encouraging enrolled members of either major party to show up at the polls. Secretary Merrill is also reporting that a total of 1,137,580 registered Democrats and Republicans are eligible to cast a ballot today for offices such as U.S. Senator, Representative in Congress, General Assembly, Registrar of Voters, and Judge of Probate. Since the beginning of 2012, more than 60,000 new voters have registered in Connecticut. A complete breakdown of Registered Voters follows at the bottom of this news release.

"If you are a registered Democrat or Republican it is very important to go out and vote today, because critical national and state government decisions will be made by the candidates we select to be on the November ballot," said Secretary Merrill, Connecticut's chief elections official. "We have some very exciting and closely contested primaries this year, and we will be available should any problems arise during the day. We have our phone and email hotline up and running should any voter feel the need to report any concerns at the polls. Make sure your voice is heard and that you exercise your right to choose the future leaders of your community and your state."

For today's primaries, the Secretary of the State's office and the State Elections Enforcement Commission have opened the Election Day hotline *1-866-SEEC-INFO (1-866-733-2463)* to report problems at the polls. In addition, the two agencies are providing an email alert contact – <u>elections@ct.gov</u> – for voters to use if they encounter any difficulties casting ballots during the day. Voters who do use the hotline or email to describe problems can either state their name or

report issues anonymously; but are asked to state the town and polling place where they are observing the problems, and provide as many specifics or details as they can. This will greatly assist SEEC or Secretary of the State's staff to address the issue and find a solution as expeditiously as possible.

In addition to the email and telephone hotline, the Secretary of the State's office and staff from the SEEC will hold three separate conference calls during the day today to share information about potential problems or complaints at the polls, and coordinate the appropriate responses to those.

Voters can go to the Secretary of the State's website <u>www.sots.ct.gov</u> to see if they are registered to vote and where their polling place is located. They can also find out information about absentee ballots and a list of candidates for the statewide primaries. Only registered Democrats and Republicans can vote in the primaries. Polls will be open from 6:00 a.m. until 8:00 p.m. today. The following primaries have been reported to the Secretary of the State's office (* denotes party endorsed candidate):
