

#### **Probate Court**

- 6 Courts and 8 Towns
- All Petitions are Accepted (Judge Denies Petitions)
- Manage approximately 3,500 petitions annually
- DCF Involved Petitions- approximately 20% of the cases

#### Family Specialist-18 Masters Level


- 1000 children served in 2019
- 25 to 30 Families Served per Family Specialist
- Facilitate Family Conferences within 2 weeks
  - Present are Petitioner, Bio Parent, Child's Attorney, Support & Providers
  - Discuss purpose of petition, obtain feedback and plan
  - Plan includes identifying needs, services to address the need; referral and support
  - Follow Up Family Conference held approximately 4 to 6 weeks




## Family Arrangements 2018-2019


## 878\* Family Arrangements sanctioned

- 11% are Active
- Court Involvement
  - 54% None
  - 37% Petitions Filed (OTC & or Neglect)
  - 5% Probate Involvement
  - 3% Other
- Safety Factors
  - 32% Substance Use
  - 17% No Safety Factor
  - 7% Immediate Unmet Need



## **Caregiver Support Team**





#### Population Served

- 88% on average are Kinship Caregivers
- 11% on average are Core Caregivers
- 4% on average are Interstate

#### Referrals Initiated

- 20% increase since 2017
- 56% on average Complete Services
- 18% on average Receive Evaluation only
- 13% on average Discontinue Services (various reason)
- 4% on average are Reunified






Family First – Kinship & Foster Care Workgroup





- 3,013 Families were Licensed from 2017 through 2019 (approx. 1,000 per year)
  - 68% Received a Kinship Caregiver License
- 3, 020 Caregiver Licenses were closed from 2017-2019 (approx. 1,000 per year)
  - 70% of the Closing were Kinship Caregivers
  - 58% of the Closing Reason- Achieved Permanency

## DCF Foster Care- Children Entering Care 2017-2019



#### **Entering Care**

• 40% on average live with a Relative

#### **Siblings**

- 2017- 184 Sibling Groups of 2 to 6 siblings
- 2018-231 Sibling Groups of 2 to 7 sibling
- 2019- 190 Sibling Groups of 2 to 6 siblings

## DCF- Permanency Data for Entry Cohort 2016-2019P

- 1,411 Children who entered care 2016 thru July 2019.
- Achieved Permanency from November 2018 to October 2019

#### **Kinship Caregivers**


19% Reunified17% Guardianship10% Adopted

#### **Congregate Care Setting**



## DCF Re-entry April 2018-March 2019

#### Re-entry within 12 months


(CFSR Round 3 Measure) most recent one-year trend in state: 1.7%



if portion of trendline is red, data quality is a concern for that period

#### Outcome 3: Decrease Re-Entry into Care

Re-entry into care is measured by the total number of children who achieve timely permanency within 12 months and re-enter care within the subsequent 12 months.




• Blue: African American Children

## DCF Placement Stability April 2018-March 2019



#### **CFSR Data Indicator**

 Connecticut is statistically performing above the national standard

#### **PIP Data**

- 88% Overall Stability (9 months of data)
- 100% living with a relative


## DCF Ombudsman 2019

#### **Callers**

- 24% are Kinship Caregivers
- 55% are Maternal Relatives
  - 33% are Maternal Grandmothers

#### **Concerns**

- To be a Resource without being the Primary Caregiver
- Request Specific Information that is Confidential
- Inconsistency in Practice
- Familial Conflict
- Lack of Information Regarding Available Resources (Family Arrangement, Probate Court)



## Connecticut Alliance of Foster and Adoptive Families

#### • Inquiries to Become a Licensed Caregiver

- 975 in 2018
- 1007 in 2019

#### Peer to Peer Mentoring

- 46 Peer Mentors
- 13% or 6 were Licensed Relative Caregivers
- 890 Families were assigned a Peer Mentor

#### Support Groups

- 39 are Offered and Posted Statewide
  - Core, Adoptive, Kinship & Grandparents Raising Grandchildren\*

#### Post Licensing Training

- 300 Courses Offered
- 2125 Individuals Registered
  - 684 Incompletes
- 1441 Individuals Certified





## **UCONN- Adoption Assistance Program**

10% on average Guardian Utilizes AAP

- Parent/Legal Guardian Request (data reflects families with open direct service case)
  - Funding Assistance
  - General Information
  - Resource Identification
- Trends
  - Low Percentage of Legal Guardians who Access Services
  - Strategies to Increase Guardian's Comfort Level to Ask for Assistance





## **DCF Subsidy**

### **Children with Active Subsidized Guardianship**

- 2,802 Active
  - 87% or 2447 Live in Connecticut
    - Top 5 Towns
      - Waterbury 8%
      - Hartford 7%
      - Bridgeport 7%
      - New Haven 5%
      - East Hartford 4%
  - 13% or 355 Living Outside of Connecticut in 32 States
    - Top 5 States
      - Florida- 22%
      - Georgia- 8%
      - New York- 8%
      - North Carolina- 7%
      - Massachusetts- 6%
